NEW YORK, Jan. 22—(AP)—The stock market registered its first upturn of the week in today's session under the leadership of steel and motors.

After following a narrowly irregular course in extremely quiet dealings, the industrial list encountered a brief flurry of demand in early afternoon. Although not all of the advances were held and a number of issues even stayed on the losing side, gains of fractions to more than a point predominated at the close. Transactions approximated 700,000 shares.

Union Pickets Grocery Store

Retail Clerks Local 201 were picketing Roy Dickson's Elmira Junction grocery store Wednesday, after Tuesday's attempts to "talk contract" with Dickson struck dead-end.

Mrs. Gliva Steward, business agent for the clerks' local, said the first picket was placed at 5 p. m. Tuesday and that one picket would be on duty at all times. "We asked Mr. Dickson to present us a proposal of his own and he refused even to do that," Mrs. Steward said. "We intend to leave the pickets on until he tells us what he doesn't like about our contract or submits one of his own."

Dickson said Wednesday that the clerks union "does not represent a majority of my employees and I see no reason why I should bargain with the union. My employees seem to be satisfied, but it's up to them."

Yield Tax Talk Billed by Stock

County Assessor George Stock said Wednesday that he will discuss a proposed yield tax on logging operations at the convention of the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn., which will meet in Portland Jan. 30 and 31.

Both Stock and County Judge Clinton Hurd have expressed themselves in favor of such a tax and have suggested that it be between 50 cents and one dollar per thousand board feet.

Stock said that he wants to sound out the lumbermen on their attitudes and to discuss the effect of such a tax on Oregon operators in competition with firms in other states. Judge Hurd pointed out that a one dollar yield tax would add only \$10 to the cost of a house using 10,000 board feet of lumber.

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
