Bank Bandit Gets \$24,500

LOS ANGELES — A pretty girl bank teller, warned by a bandit that "heroes die young," used the keys from her boss' desk to open a vault and hand the bandit, \$24,500 in bills, police said Wednesday.

Pointing a gun at Dolores Huss, 19, the man slipped her a note Wednesday reading:

"Instructions: Do as I say. Go to Marsh's desk, get the keys from the middle drawer. No false moves. You're covered. Don't play hero. Heroes die young."

The robbery went unnoticed by bank clerks or customers until another employee went into the vault and found Miss Huss hysterical.

Charges Due On Dumping

Complaints against two River Road residents who are alleged to have dumped garbage on county roads will be filed with the district attorney this week, according to W. J. Cloyes, county senior sanitarian.

Cloyes said that his office is "snowed under" with reports of illegal and unsanitary garbage practices. State police are watching for violations of state and local ordinances, which prohibit dumping of garbage anywhere except in authorized municipal dumps.

Residents of rural areas must bury garbage under not less than one foot of dirt.

Swisshome Firm Bid For Timber Is High

Hale Bros. Logging Co. of Swisshome offered the high bid of \$9.35 per thousand board feet for Douglas fir and \$3 per thousand for western hemlock in a recent Willamette National Forest timber sale involving 1,149,000 board feet of mostly Douglas fir, J. R. Bruckart, forest supervisor, announced Wednesday.

The sale area is located in the McKenzie River drainage, approximately two miles above McKenzie Bridge. Several timber sales are presently being advertised in the North and South Santiam drainages of the Willamette National Forest, Bruckart said.
