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New Church Opening Set

SPRINGFIELD — Inaugural
services will be held Saturday in
the new Seventh-day Adventist
Church here to mark the opening
of the building at Seventh and A
Sts.

The Rev. C. A. Scriven, presi-
dent of the Oregon Conference of
Seventh-day Adventists, will de-
liver the inaugural address at 10
a.m. Saturday. Pastor of the local
church is O. E. Schnepfer.

The estimated value of the
building and property when some
remaining finishing touches are
completed is above \$20,000. Most
of the work has been done by
members and the church was con-
structed free of debt.

An auditorium to seat 250 per-
sons has been finished and work
is progressing on a balcony, Pas-
tor Schnepfer said.

The Springfield church was or-
ganized in 1943 with 34 members
and has grown to a membership
of about 150. Services during most
of the last three years have been
held in the local Legion Hall.

Work on the building was
started in September, 1945. Last
fall basement rooms were com-
pleted sufficiently to permit ser-
vices there. Dedication services
are planned for next summer,
when it is expected the building
will be completely finished.

The church supports a parochial
school of 32 members, which
meets in the basement rooms. A
separate building is planned for
these students, the pastor said.

Pastor Schnepfer said he wished
to extend "a heartfelt thanks to
all the members and friends who
have so generously helped in
erecting this building."

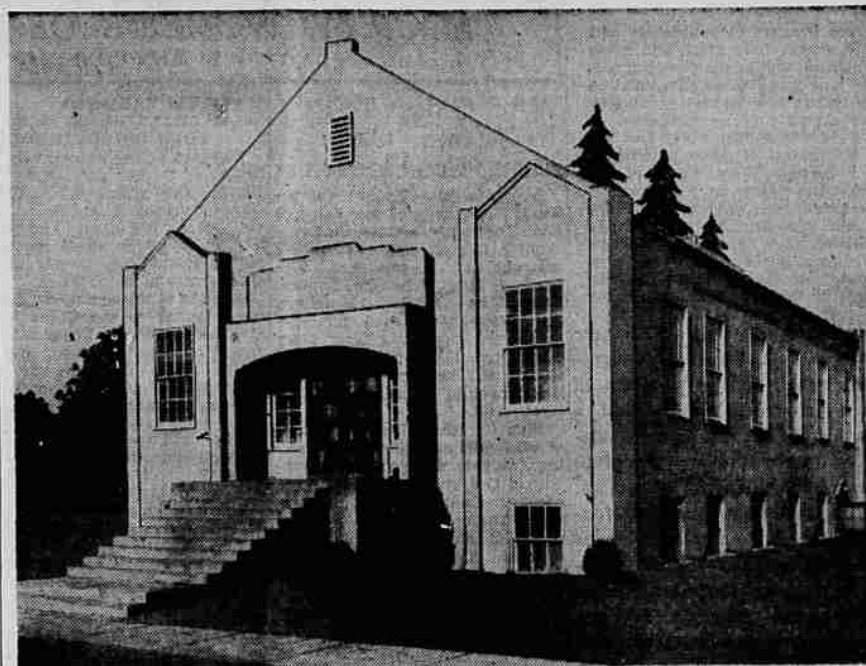

City Workers Ask More Pay

SPRINGFIELD—City employees
requested a blanket \$20 monthly
pay raise in a petition submitted
Thursday to Mayor Claude T.
Gerlach. Petitioners declared ris-
ing living costs were working a
hardship on members of all three
of the city's pay brackets.

The raise, if granted, would
mean an increase in this city's
monthly payroll of approximately
\$340. It would be retroactive to
Jan. 1. The petition also asked for
a meeting of council members and
department heads to discuss the
request.

Signers to the petition pointed
out that other cities in Western
Oregon have increased pay since
the beginning of the fiscal year
by using unbudgeted city revenue.
Most of the cities granted \$20
raises, one went to \$25. The 17
city employees say the city now
has an unbudgeted surplus.

The city pay scale now starts at
\$175, progresses to \$185 for the
assistant fire chief and police cap-
tain, and goes to \$205 for depart-
ment heads.

New Medical Center Financing Discussed

SPRINGFIELD—Harry Wright,
chairman of the Chamber of

be to determine the method of
financing such a move and gain
public support for the plan.

the association.

The association has recommended
minimum salaries for staff
