

10 Million Board Foot Annual Cut Planned for Pope-Talbot Mill

A gross allowable cut of approximately 40,000,000 board feet annually from national forest lands and the old Penn Timber Co. holdings near Oakridge, according to a recent agreement with Pope and Talbot, has been announced by the U. S. Forest Service, in Portland.

The Pope and Talbot operation is one of two private agreements entered into by the recently signed National Forest Management Act. The unit in the Grays Harbor area in Washington, this would allow a gross cut of 135,000,000 board feet of Northwest timber yearly from sustained yield programs.

The old Penn holdings, acquired five years ago by Cascades Plywoods Co. and purchased recently by Pope and Talbot, comprise 22,000 acres of timber, 30,000 of which are located on the

Final rites for Donald F. Williams, 29, 115 11th Ave. E., Eugene, will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at Simon Mortuary, with interment in Rest Haven Memorial Park. Born Oct. 17, 1917, at Dillon, Mont., he made his home in Eugene the past five years and was employed by Southern Pacific Railroad as a locomotive fireman. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and a veteran of World War II.

Besides his widow, Elizabeth, he is survived by an infant daughter, Sylvia Clair; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fredric A. Williams, Eugene; two brothers, Richard H., Spokane, and Rex J., San Francisco.

Services for Oscar W. Stelzer, 22, Williams' companion on the flight, will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. at the Bethesda Lutheran Church, with the Rev. Ingward Olsen officiating. Interment will be at IOOF Cemetery No. 2, with Poole-Larsen Mortuary in charge.

Stelzer was born at Two Rivers, Wis. March 29, 1924, was graduated from high school at Mishicot, Wis. in 1941, and left for Eugene with his family the day after his graduation. He entered the army in 1943, serving in the American, Asiatic-Pacific, European-African and Middle Eastern Theaters, and held the Good Conduct Medal, Victory Medal and Philippine Liberation Ribbon. 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Dr. Beall Receives \$500 Research Grant

A research grant of \$500 has been received by Dr. Chandler B. Beall, professor of Romance languages in the University of Oregon, from the American Philosophical Society of Philadelphia. The grants is for a project on comparative literature.

Started several years ago, Dr. Beall's project is concerned with a study of the influence of the Italian poet, Torquato Tasso, on English literature. The research grant will make possible the completion of the project in another year, Dr. Beall said.

Five years ago the Oregon professor published a study on Tasso's influence on French literature in a volume published in French by the University of Oregon Press. Dr. Beall received a grant from the Modern Language Association of America at that time. Both projects were partially supported by research funds of the Oregon state system of higher education.
