

Building Supply Outlook Told

CHICAGO (AP)—J. L. Haynes, chief of the construction division of the U. S. Department of Commerce said Wednesday his division believes there will be sufficient material to supply the predicted \$2,000,000,000 construction demand this year.

In an address prepared for the 14th annual convention of the Associated General Contractors of America, Haynes, of Washington, said: "As you might judge, how-

ever, the situation will be spotty." He summarized the picture thus:

"Brick inventories are at the highest level in 28 months. Lumber production last year was excellent with stocks accumulating."

"Soil pipe production has been increasing, but hardly meeting the estimated needs."

"I doubt that wholesale and retail inventories (of materials) will be normal until at least next winter."

"The export of building materials has not seriously affected the domestic building program."

"The price level of construction materials rose rapidly and substantially in '46."

"It is, in sum, the feeling of the construction division that with strikes as usual; i. e., something less than the '46 pattern, a slight softening of the house market, a better flow of building materials; a materials demand less than capacity, construction and building materials costs will advance somewhat, but less than they did in '46."

DETROIT (AP)—Approximately 14,000 Hudson Motor Car Co. employees returned to their jobs Wednesday after a two-day work stoppage called to protest a disciplinary suspension given a shop steward.

The steward, James Bommarito, was laid off Monday after he instructed a male worker not to relieve a woman employee. Bommarito's assertion that this was contrary to contract provisions was upheld by officers of Local 154, United Automobile Workers (CIO).

Europe Hard Hit by Cold

LONDON (AP)—London temperatures tumbled to 18-year lows and icy blasts of the most severe cold wave of the winter took a mounting toll of life in fuel-short French and German cities Wednesday.

Swept by gales from Siberia, the British capital was colder than Moscow. The cold even affected Big Ben, making the big clock's chiming stutter in the night.

Suburban London temperatures dropped to 11 above zero (Fahrenheit). The Kew Weather Observatory reported 15 above, lowest since February, 1929, and the coldest January night since 1894.

At various points in the English countryside temperatures dropped to five above, equalling the official low in Berlin, where thousands of miserable residents huddled in cold lodgings or crowded into public warming halls.

Suffering was acute in the German capital, where more than 60 persons have frozen to death since Dec. 1, city health officials reported. During the seven weeks from Dec. 1 to Jan. 15, the city health office also announced, 188 persons were taken to hospitals with frozen limbs and 19,000 others required treatment for frostbite.

At least three deaths from the cold were reported in Paris Wednesday.

Many French towns reported record low temperatures for the night. Commentary, in central France, reported a reading of seven below zero (Fahrenheit).

Hundreds of Parisians, too poor to buy their low-priced fuel ration, crowded into subway stations to sleep on benches until herded out at 1:30 a.m., closing time.

With coal deliveries halted by frozen canals, Paris officials announced new restrictions on gas consumption would become effective Feb. 1.

Moscow, with a sunny 56 degrees (Fahrenheit), was one of the continent's warmest cities.

Patterson Tells Draft Position

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—The Army will not ask for an extension of selective service beyond March 31 if it can get enough volunteers, according to Secretary of War Patterson.

However, current enlistments are not up to the 35,000 a month the Army needs, Patterson told the Wyoming chapter of the Reserve Officers Assn. in a statement delivered by Association President Vincent Mulvaney.

Patterson had been scheduled to address the association following an inspection of Fort Francis E. Warren, but his schedule did not permit his remaining here for the dinner.

The Army had scarcely half the volunteers it needed in November and December, according to Patterson's statement, and although this month will show an increase, it will not be up to the 35,000-mark.

He said the War Department's recommendations on continuation of the draft are expected within 10 days.

Germans to Hang For Slaying Airmen

DACHAU, Germany (AP)—An American Military Court Wednesday sentenced to death by hanging three Germans who admitted on the witness stand that they shot five American fliers in the back while the airmen were being marched ahead of them as prisoners of war.

The Germans, Gustav Stork, Gustav Deppe and Franz Durschke two former policemen and a chimney sweep—said they shot the Americans in August, 1944, on order from a rural district police chief.

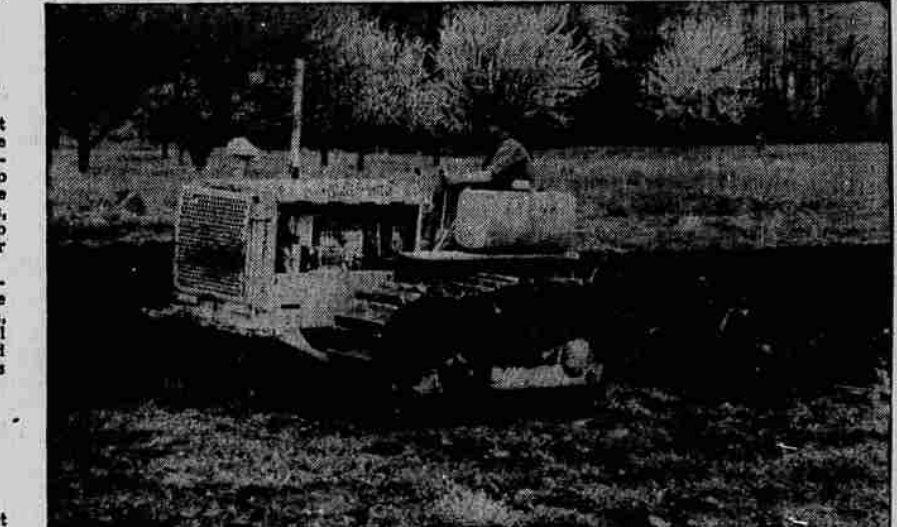

G.I. Students Can Be Tax 'Dependents'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Parents of veterans attending school under the G.I. Bill of Rights got a break Wednesday in a Treasury ruling covering their income tax.

The Treasury ruled a parent, in figuring income tax, may take an exemption for a son getting more than \$500 from the Veterans Administration to attend school, provided the parent furnishes more than one-half the son's support.

This amounted to an exception to the general rule that no one can be counted as a dependent if his gross income exceeds \$500 a year. G.I. educational payments, such as tuition, do not constitute income for tax purposes, the ruling said. These payments are made directly to the educational institution.

On the other hand, the Treasury said the amount the parent spends on support of the son

must be more than the amount of G.I.-benefit money used by the son toward supporting himself.
