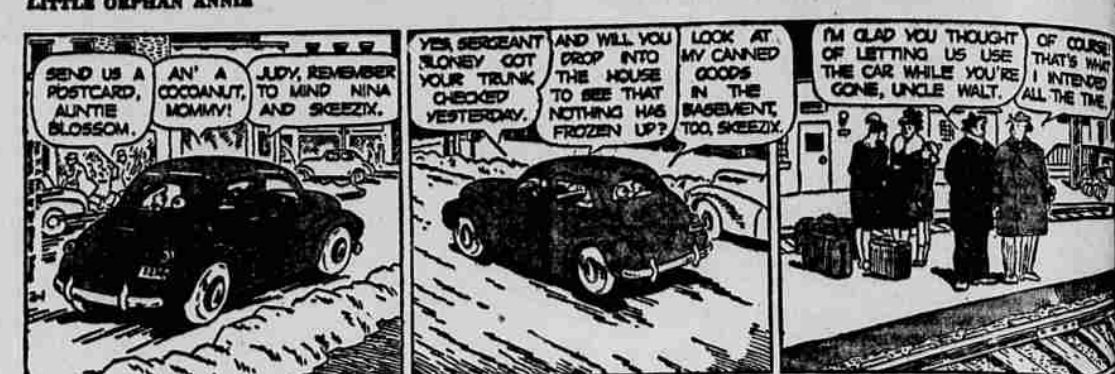
Several families gathered at the Goldson Hall Sunday to do some much needed repairs on the hall. The ladies served a turkey dinner.

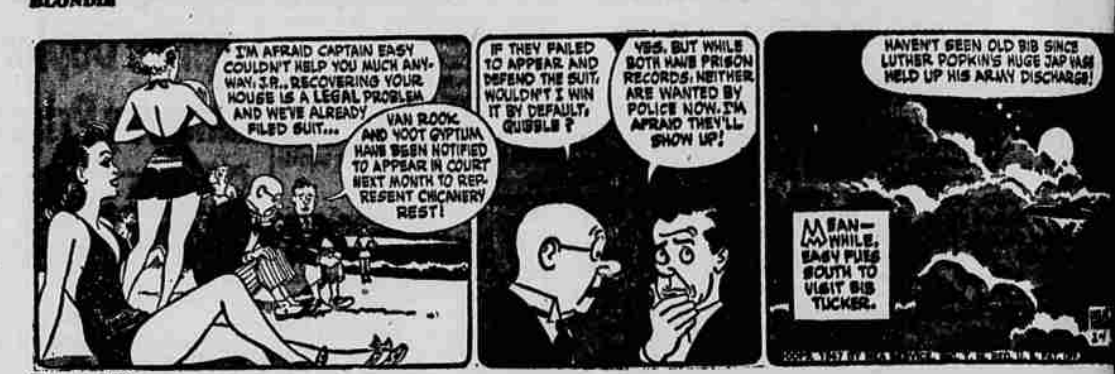
