Mrs. Dale Pitcher went to Bremerton the first of the week to meet her husband who is returning from army service in Germany.

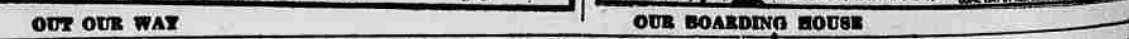
