Expansion Planned For Hoodoo Ski Bowl

First plans for the expansion of the Santiam Ski Area in Hoodoo Bowl will be laid this weekend by Bill Parks, recreational engineer of the forest service, who will visit the area Saturday through Tuesday. Roy Elliott, assistant supervisor of Willamette National Forest, will accompany him to the area.

The national forest men will make a survey of the area with an eye toward downhill trails that will be cleared with the installation of a lift to the top of Hoodoo Butte. They will also look over "organizational sites" for winter residences, and will discuss the possibility of installing a jump.

While in Hoodoo Bowl they will attend the Junior Obsidian giant slalom Sunday.

Warning Issued On Care of Seeds

Open packages of 2,4-D left close to legume seeds in the same room or building may completely ruin their germination, warns Mrs. Louisa A. Kanipe, botanist in charge of the state seed testing laboratory at O.S.C.

Volatiles fumes from such a package in the laboratory on a warm day last May seriously damaged the germination of all legume seeds in open containers at the time, while grass seed showed no ill effects. The legume seeds swelled and sprouted in the germinator but the sprouts turned brown and stopped growing.

PORTLAND — (AP) — Wage negotiations in the Pacific Northwest lumber industry probably will be underway next month.

Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the AFL Northwestern Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, said the AFL districts are expected to reopen the wage question during the month of February. Thirty days' notice are necessary in AFL contracts to bring up wage changes.

The CIO International Woodworkers of America have already served notice of desire to reopen wage contracts.

New Ski Tow Installed At Crater Lake Park

A new 900-foot rope tow has been installed in Crater Lake National Park for use of skiers. It was announced recently by E. P. Leavitt, park superintendent.

The tow is located in the bowl below the lodge, and carries skiers to the top of Knob Hill at an elevation of about 200 feet. The rates are \$1.75 for all day from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m.; \$1.50 from noon to 4 p. m.; \$1 from 2 to 4 p. m.; and 60 cents from 3 to 4 p. m. The rates are subject to change when given official approval.

A bus is also operating from park headquarters to the rim of the lake, Leavitt said, so that skiers may ride up and ski down the expert or novice trail without taking cars to the rim. Cost of the ride is 15 cents one way.

New York Markets

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 — (AP) — Rail stocks, as well as most industrial and utilities, suffered from profit taking in today's market although a few favorites continued selling with moderate success. Prices slipped after a fairly easy opening, revived around midday and resumed the retreat in the fourth hour as the carriers met liquidation. Declines of fractions to 2 or more points predominated at the close. Dealings, while slow at intervals, quickened occasionally and topped the million-mark for the tenth consecutive full session. The day's aggregate approximated 1,200,000 shares.

Wall Street still was bullish over the labor picture, dividends, earnings and the business outlook. Numerous customers reduced accounts, however, on the idea that the recent bulge of the averages to new peaks since last August called for a technical correction. Sentiment also was cooled by a drop in the London market apparently inspired by the critical British fuel situation.

Bonds were uneven. Cotton futures, toward the last, were up 95 cents to \$2.35 a bale.
