Losses Seen In Yield Tax Plan

Tax losses to Lane County of from \$18,000 to \$20,000 annually if the forest yield tax now before the state legislature is adopted, were predicted Thursday by County Assessor George Stock, who said that the county now gains that much each year from personal-property taxes on logs and lumber.

The legislature measure, which would bring the state 20 cents on each thousand board feet, would give the state a first lien on logs. Proceeds would go to reforest the Tillamook burn area in northwestern Oregon.

Stock said that the county now has a first lien on such property for tax purposes and that he expects his appraisers to report the value of Jan. 1 log inventories as "in the neighborhood" of \$300,000. He said that he has been corresponding with legislators, urging them to rewrite or drop the bill.

Military Flying Wing Rocket Flight Revealed by Northrop

LOS ANGELES—(P)—Northrop Aircraft disclosed Thursday that America's first military rocket plane—perhaps the world's—was flown from isolated Harper dry lake on the desert July 5, 1944, and then was placed on the Army's list of top secrets.

The craft, the MX-324, was a flying wing type with only a 30-foot span and embodied the "prone cockpit" wherein the pilot lay flat on his stomach to withstand the buffeting of far more violent maneuvers than were possible in a conventionally-powered plane, Northrop said.

The tiny rocket plane was glider-flown Oct. 2, 1943, by John Myers, now Northrop's vice-president in charge of sales, the company said. Then early in the summer of 1944 it was taken to Harper dry lake, near Barstow, Calif.

The morning of July 5 Test Pilot Harry Crosby climbed into the little craft, which was attached to a P-38 fighter by a towline. With the Lockheed furnishing the power, the planes took off and at 8000 feet Crosby cut her loose and turned on the rocket power.

The flying wing flashed across the field and remained in flight about five minutes, after which Crosby made a gentle landing.

A rocket engine differs from a jet power plant in that it contains all components to furnish its thrust. The jet engine uses oxygen from the air.
