

Protestant Convention Evolves Program of Economic Principles

MEMPHIS — (AP) — Delegates to an experimental Protestant conference on economic principles carried back to their churches a proposed program which one leader called "an important step toward a more Christian society."

About 350 weary laymen and clergymen at the National Conference on the Church and Economic Life, sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches of America, wound up five days of warm discussion Friday night with a stand they took in their churches would be "Exceeded."

Chairman Charles P. Taft, of Cincinnati, declared the conference exceeded his hopes and that he had set in motion a program within the Protestant churches which should in time lead to widespread study and discussion by Christian laymen of the application of their religious faith to the problems they face in every day living.

Taft, who also is president of the federal council, said the next step was to "bring reconciliation to the fields of conflict and progress toward a more Christian society."

The adopted program advanced these highlights:

1. A declaration that society "cannot tolerate" monopolies in business or labor.
2. The statement that while profits are defensible, Christians should subordinate profits to service.
3. The stand that Christianity belongs to no particular economic system but that its principles apply to "the organization of society" as well as personal relationships.
4. An assertion that property is held in "trusteeship under God" and that further experiments should be made, where public regulation is difficult, to study "forms of private, cooperative and public ownership."

The delegates, two-thirds of whom were laymen, declared society as a whole has the responsibility of providing "the opportunity to work," suggested theology students be given training in economics, and urged the church to sharpen its knowledge of industrial relations.

Ship Distains Aid, Limp On

ASTORIA — (AP) — The last of the wooden-hulled steam schooners on the West Coast, the Catherine II, limped Friday toward San Francisco, disdaining offers of aid from the Coast Guard.

The ship, loaded with wooden ties for the Orient, sprang two leaks and reported rudder trouble 60 miles off Astoria Thursday. There was some doubt whether she could make it into port here, but like wooden ships before her, she did not call for aid.

The Coast Guard Cutter Onondaga went out to stand by anyway, but after locating the Catherine by radar in the fog, was told jury repairs had been rigged and help was not needed. The master said she would head for San Francisco.

The vessel, formerly the Whitney Olson, is owned by the Login Corp., San Francisco, under Panamanian registry. There are about 30 crewmen aboard, commanded by Capt. V. Christensen.

Farmers Union Ends Conclave

ALBANY — (AP) — The Oregon Farmers Union elected officers and passed 30 resolutions Thursday night at the close of its annual convention.

The organization endorsed a Columbia Valley authority, then expressed opposition to the following legislative proposals:

The State Highway Department's "throughway" bill; the business tax; the sales tax; county planning and zoning; a bill to increase state and county officials' salaries without popular vote. All "anti-labor" legislation also was opposed.

The group urged that the "most-favored nation" clause be eliminated from international treaties, and asked that restriction be placed on agricultural imports.

Also proposed were a general building and improvement program for state institutions; a 25 per cent cut in sugar quotas for beverage manufacturers and a corresponding increase for householders; repeal of the rural school district law, and an amendment making the office of public utilities commissioner non-partisan.

Ronald Jones, Brooks, was re-elected president. Gus Schlicker, Marion County, was named vice-president; and Ammon Grice, Polk County; William Jensen, Linn County, and Eldon Emmerson, Wasco County, directors.

New Boss Impresses State Dept. Aides

WASHINGTON — (AP) — George C. Marshall Friday rounds out his first month as secretary of state with his top aides convinced, along with Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), that he already is "obviously on top of his job."

Marshall observed the occasion by turning away from the grind at his big oak desk for a two-day trip to receive honorary degrees from Columbia and Princeton Universities.

It was the cabinet officer's first absence of more than a few hours from his three-fold task of (1) mastering thorny problems of foreign policy, (2) dealing with urgent current issues, and (3) preparing for the March 10 Moscow conference of the Big Four foreign ministers.

Sandwiched in have been two detailed reviews of world problems at closed sessions of congressional committees, one of which produced the "on top of his job" comment from Vandenberg, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Dairy Manufacturers Urge Law Codifying

CORVALLIS — (AP) — The Oregon Dairy Manufacturers Assn. Thursday night urged codification of all Oregon laws pertaining to the dairy industry.

O. K. Beals, head of the State Department of Agriculture's division of foods and dairies, said it would remove conflicts and dead-wood.

The association elected Jack Wright, McMinnville, president; Richard Trout, Portland, vice-president; F. F. Moser, Corvallis, treasurer; and Dr. G. H. Wilster, Corvallis, secretary. Jorgen Jorgensen, Medford, and F. A. Keasey, Eugene, were named directors.

Storm Delays UN Hearing

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. — Heavy snow which swept the eastern seaboard Friday forced postponement of the United Nations Security Council session on the Albanian case.

The United Nations announced the council would meet Monday to continue debate on the British charges against Albania.

The announcement came as Great Britain made it clear she would oppose a Columbian proposal to refer to the International Court of Justice her complaint that Albania is responsible for the deaths of 44 seamen in two royal navy destroyers blasted by mines in Corfu Channel last Oct. 22.

British delegate Sir Alexander Cadogan remarked tartly that the International Court of Justice is "not a police court."

Courts Martial Revamping Favored

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Members of the House Armed Services Committee Friday promised speedy action on Army proposals for changing the Articles of War to meet criticism that military justice is loaded against enlisted men.

Secretary Patterson said the War Department favors amendments which would (1) legalize appointment of GI's to serve on courts martial, now the prerogative of officers only; (2) end the mandatory sentence of death or life imprisonment for rape, and (3) protect courts martial from high-ranking outside pressure.

Chairman Elston (R-Ohio) of the armed services legal subcommittee said the changes appear to embody most recommendations of a sharply critical report by the House Military group which investigated the court martial system last year. Elston told a reporter he will try to get them before Congress as quickly as possible.

States Ponder Bonus Plans

State lawmakers have proposed the payment of veterans' bonuses totalling several hundred million dollars, a survey showed Friday.

In some states, however, passage of the bonus laws may be deferred, and in still others the methods of financing the bonus must be approved by the voters.

In general, the bonus proposals would provide for payment of specific sums to veterans on the basis of the time they spent in service, with larger payments for time spent overseas.

Bonus bills have been submitted in the state legislatures of Michigan, Texas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, Colorado, Iowa, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Indiana and Connecticut.

Illinois already has passed a soldier's bonus, and payments are scheduled to begin next summer.
