

Grove Adds 'Mead Plat'

COTTAGE GROVE—A new addition to the city here is Mead plat, 34 lots on the north boundary of the municipal limit, near the Pacific Highway. This is the second addition to be accepted by the city council in the past few months. Woodson addition of 19 lots is the other.

The council, at its last meeting, also permitted the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. to lay a cable under ground on Sixth street and south.

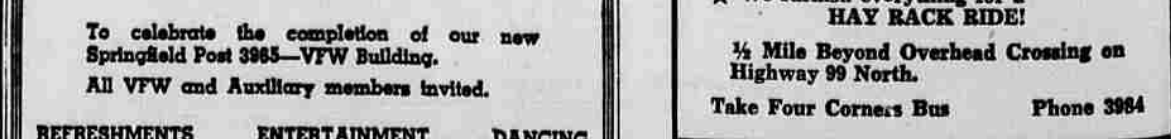
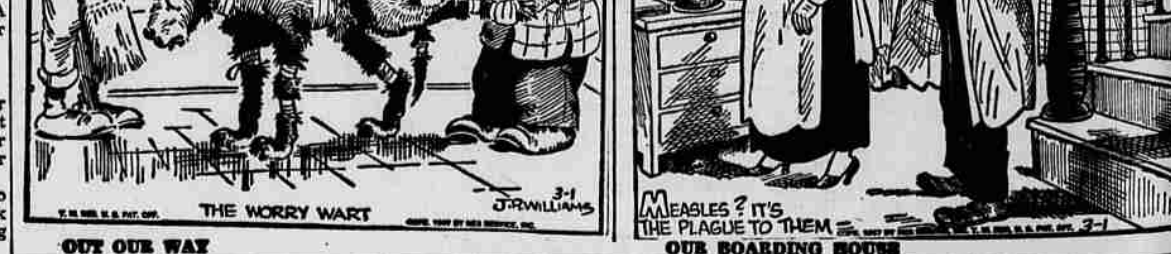
