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Religion, Labor Seek Newsprint

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Spokesmen for religious and labor publications told Congress Wednesday that they are being forced out of business by the newsprint shortage and the "black market" prices charged by some jobbers.

Their protests were aired before the Senate Newsprint Subcommittee after Chairman Homer E. Capehart (R-Ind) announced that he would ask the Justice Department to investigate specific cases of discriminatory prices.

Monopoly Charged
Thomas B. Wright of the CIO Committee on Publications charged that the larger daily newspapers have monopolized newsprint supplies through their "connections" with paper mills and now are making sure none goes to smaller papers so they can "keep them from speaking effectively."

He admitted under questioning, however, that his accusation was based "purely on hearsay" and that he knew of no specific instance where this had occurred.

The Rev. John S. Randall of Rochester, N. Y., editor of the Catholic Courier Journal, said that continuation of the newsprint "black market" inevitably would lead to the death of Catholic newspapers and magazines as well as other weeklies and periodicals.

H. H. Reimer, representing the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, said his non-profit organization employing 250 persons has been "thrown out to \$250-a-ton wolves."

"We are trying to educate the people on the Bible and keep the honor of Almighty God and comfort people," he said. "We are being stifled by a lack of newsprint and . . . this prodigious advertising that fills a whole page with French perfume or a milk coat."

All three urged Congress to restore government controls over the price and allocation of available newsprint supplies.

Miss Truman To Broadcast

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Miss Margaret Truman will make her radio debut as a singer on the Sunday evening hour program of the American Broadcasting Co. at 8 to 9 p. m. (EST) Sunday, the White House announced Thursday.

The program will originate in Detroit. The President's daughter and her voice teacher, Mrs. T. J. Strickler of Kansas City, Mo., are in Detroit now, preparing for the program.

(At Detroit, a spokesman for Henry H. Reichhold, president of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and sponsor of the Sunday evening series, confirmed that Miss Truman arrived Wednesday and was given an audition before Conductor Karl Krueger.)

President Truman will be on a trip to the Caribbean at the time to observe Atlantic fleet maneuvers. He is expected to hear his daughter over the radio.

\$25,000,000 Loan Granted Philippines

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States Thursday loaned the Philippines \$25,000,000 to help the new republic get on its feet.

An agreement signed by the Reconstruction Finance Corp. and Philippines Ambassador Joaquin M. Elizalde says the loan will be repaid Jan. 1, 1952. It will bear two per cent interest in the meantime.

The \$25,000,000 is part of a \$75,000,000 credit authorized by Congress to help the Philippine government meet immediate financial requirements.

Forester to Receive Bids on Lane Timber

Bids on state timber northeast of Noti will be received in the office of State Forester Nelson Rogers at Salem until 10 a. m. March 24, Rogers announced Thursday.

The timber designated for cutting consists of 4,946,000 board feet of old growth Douglas fir, 250,000 feet of second growth Douglas fir, 17,000 feet of hemlock and 23,000 feet of red cedar. It is located on lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, section 22, township 16 south, range 7 west, Willamette meridian.

Big 4 Ministers En Route to Parley

PARIS — (AP) — Secretary of State George C. Marshall arrived here Thursday en route to Moscow while another plane bearing John Foster Dulles and other advisers for the foreign ministers' conference landed in Berlin.

Marshall planned to continue to Berlin Friday. French Foreign Secretary Georges Bidault, also en route to Moscow, was in Berlin Thursday, while British Secretary Ernest Bevin spent a few hours in Warsaw.

USSR Gives Poland Financial Aid

MOSCOW — (AP) — The Soviet Union will loan Poland \$28,855,000 in gold and deliver armament and other military equipment on credit, it was announced Thursday.

A Polish delegation headed by Prime Minister Josef Cyrankiewicz has been in Moscow since Feb. 25.

The agreement provides for a 50 per cent reduction in Polish coal shipments to Russia; the return to Poland of railroad rolling stock seized by the Russians as "booty"; and the return by May 15 of "parts of the German merchant fleet credited to Poland."
