Plane Landings. High up the list of items scheduled for discussion Sunday is the matter of regulating and restricting the use of Oregon lakes for landing amphibious planes with fishing parties.

The matter was first brought to the league's attention when a Mr. Davies of San Jose, Calif., sought permits from the Deschutes National Forest to land his planes, loaded with California fishermen, on Diamond, Odell, Waldo, Crescent and Davis Lakes in the Willamette National Forest.

Would Restrict. Folts said the Willamette chapter would present a resolution restricting plane landings to Crescent Lake alone. Directors of the chapter felt, he said, that "to allow indiscriminate landings on lakes in Oregon would mean that a small group of anglers could spoil the recreation of many and that while Oregon welcomes its tourists as a resource, they must come in on an equal footing rather than as a public nuisance and a public hazard."

Also on the agenda is the problem of debris in the Siuslaw and other coastal streams. The legislative interim Game Commission investigation is scheduled for discussion at the same meeting.

Police Hold Pair For 12 Burglaries

PORTLAND—(AP)—State police said Thursday that two young men had confessed 12 burglaries, the younger man explaining he was stealing tools in order to go into business for himself.

The pair, arrested Tuesday night in Hillsboro, gave their names as Alvin Irving Neely, 20, and Warren John Gereaux, 21. They lived together in Milwaukie.

State Policeman E. Herder said Neely told him he and his wife and baby could not live on his cannery wages, and that he lacked money to buy tools.

Tools and hardware recovered from a shed to which Herder said the men directed him were valued at \$5000. Police said the equipment had been taken from 10 stores in Washington County, one in Milwaukie, and one in Battleground, Wash.
