

Wife of Unitarian Minister Tells Source of Arab-Jewish Friction

The Palestine picture, as seen by the wife of a Unitarian minister, was presented to Eugeneans at a dinner Wednesday evening by Mrs. Martha Sharp of Boston, nationally known humanitarian. Mrs. Sharp's appearance here was sponsored by Hadassah, Jewish women's Zionist society.

The terrorism and violence going on in Palestine, the speaker said, is the fault of reckless youths of the Irgun and Stern groups who are no part of, and not countenanced by, the Zionists. Haganah, the legitimate defense arm of the Jewish agency is taking steps to counteract their activities and

perhaps to bring the offenders to punishment.

The conflict in Palestine is not so much a matter between Jew and Arab, she stated, as between Britain and Russia. There are three and a half full divisions of British troops quartered there.

She sees it as "an area of unrest being made an excuse for establishment of a Middle East command, moved from Egypt." She believes the British mandate in Palestine should be referred to United Nations; that at least 100,000 Jews should be allowed to enter Palestine, and that the U. S. immigration quotas should be increased to permit entry of refugees, many of whom are Christians.

Mrs. Sharp said the young Jews in Palestine have taken the poorest land and by monumental effort have transformed it into a fruitful, productive region.

She asserted that their work has greatly improved the living conditions of Arabs as well, and that Arab and Jew would live peacefully together in Palestine, were it not for the disturbing influence of Arab overlords.

She cited the Grand Mufti, whom she believes to be working with Russia. His anti-British efforts in the past war are documented and proven, she stated.

If all the Jews in Europe were transported to Palestine, they could not outnumber the Arabs already in Palestine, she said. There are a million and a quarter Arabs there, to 800,000 Jews; Europe has only about 400,000 more. Only 20 per cent of the displaced persons in Europe are Jews, she said. They want to go to Palestine because they say they feel they cannot trust any Christian nation again.

Mrs. Sharp, who addressed approximately 200 at the dinner, will speak on station KORE Thursday from 8:15 to 8:30 p.m., on the same topic.

Council to Mull Night Parking

SPRINGFIELD—The city council is going to attempt a solution to the all-night parking problem here at a meeting to be held in the city hall Monday at 7:30 p.m., with truck drivers and others who leave vehicles parked all night on city streets.

At the March 10 council meeting it was learned that all-night parking has drawn complaints from several city residents. Councilmen also affirmed that parking heavy trucks on Springfield's partially improved streets was causing considerable damage to streets, as well as being a traffic hazard. They said most of the vehicles are parked without lights.

City police have been ordered to begin enforcement of an ordinance prohibiting parking for more than two hours between midnight and 6 a.m.

Police to Eye Dog Practices

SPRINGFIELD—Police Chief C. K. Pryor announced Thursday that

the police force will be detailed to three hours extra duty daily as a dog catcher.

Pryor said this is in accordance with the provisions of a city ordinance requiring that all dogs be tied during the gardening season, April 1 to Sept. 1.

The ordinance applies to both licensed and unlicensed dogs. Pryor said. He warned that dogs picked up will be impounded and if not recovered within eight days they will be disposed of.

Red Cross Fund Said Now at 80 Per Cent

SPRINGFIELD—The Red Cross fund campaign in this area has reached the 80 per cent mark, according to Bill Karp, general chairman.

Karp said \$4000 had been received of the \$5000 goal, and that reports are still being made. The Red Cross headquarters in the city library was scheduled to close Friday. Late returns should be submitted to the Chamber of Commerce office in the U. S. National Bank building, Karp reported.
