Central Reports New Citizen in Residence; "Long-Tailed Chat"

CENTRAL—The long-tailed chat, allied to the warblers, has been heard by several residents of Central as long as two weeks ago as well as recently. Willet Jesse has reported having seen one but not at close range. as the chat is a very timid bird.

"Very unusual! Very interesting!" was the comment of Prof. Ralph R. Huettis of the University of Oregon biology department. "The chat is hardly ever seen around here before May. It is a sulphur-yellow colored bird, about the build of a robin, with a long tail. It has a number of calls and notes, and will 'whistle' as if calling your dog. Many observers swear that this is done deliberately. At any rate, it is a very conversational bird, appears to be interested in human sounds, and will imitate musical sounds and the calls of other birds. It is often known as the Oregon Mockingbird."
