Divisions of the show will include narcissus or daffodil, with divisions; five divisions for primroses; three divisions for tulips; four divisions for hyacinths; one for flowering shrubs and three divisions under the classification of "general."

SEATTLE—(AP)—West Coast Airline service between Portland and Medford may be inaugurated within 60 days, Executive Vice-President H. A. Munter said here Friday.

Conversion of DC-3 aircraft and re-establishment of a surplus Navy range station at Coos Bay have held up service south of Portland, although two routes between Seattle and Portland have been in operation since last December, Munter said.

Dr. Hugh Miller, son of Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Miller of Florence, recently accepted a position with the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque, in which he will have full charge of graduate work in music and the opportunity to do research work as well.

Timber Draws New High Bids

The U. S. Forest Service Friday reported that Siuslaw forest timber sale bids have reached a new high. Prices of \$17.98 for a thousand board feet of Douglas fir and \$14.95 for cedar were bid in a sale of 13,000,000 board feet in the Cape Creek area near Florence.

A high of \$18.10 per thousand board feet of Douglas fir was bid early this year in a Willamette National Forest timber sale. Another national forest in Oregon has reported bids of more than \$25 per thousand feet in Douglas fir.

Dam on St. Mary's River to Be Asked

CORVALLIS—(AP)—Flood control backers here sought data Friday to bolster arguments to be presented at Eugene April 24 in support of a Mary's River dam.

C. A. Mockmore committee chairman, said it was understood that a report to be submitted by Army engineers at the Eugene meeting on plans for Willamette Valley flood control would not include the Mary's River dam.

He said preliminary statements would be consolidated at a meeting here April 15 and would seek to show need for the dam.

Beach Bathers Warned Of War's Leftovers

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Warning ocean bathers and fishermen against handling strange objects found on west coast beaches, the 12th Naval District revealed several near-tragedies.

In one instance a fishing boat skipper netted a live depth charge, lifted it aboard his vessel and brought it into port for investigation. Bomb experts discovered the charge was armed and dangerous.

In another case, a mother discovered her six-year-old son playing in the sand with a long tin object, which upon investigation turned out to be a live bomb fuse.

as "coins for exchange"—Andreyev called it "a practice of embezzling that should be stopped"—and that individuals and groups had embezzled or "improperly appropriated" land from collective farms.)

The Paris source said that at Christmas time, when the food situation grew worse in Russia, the government began slaughtering unprecedented numbers of cattle.

Two Reasons

"There were two reasons," he said. "The first reason was that the cattle were about to die from lack of forage. The second was to have meat for human consumption."

"As a result, there is more meat to eat in cities of Russia now than in many years. But the country's cattle population—far below normal as a result of the war—has been reduced enormously. It is estimated that one-third of Russia's cattle has been butchered this winter."

Another factor contributing to the situation was the fact that UNRRA food shipments, a major source of supplies for the Donets Basin industrial workers and cities in the Ukraine, drew to an end this winter.

Willamette Ski Towing to Halt
