

Sugar Stamp Becomes Valid

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Spare ration stamp No. 11 was validated Tuesday for another 10 pounds of sugar to each household consumer.

OPA officials said the stamp will be good through Sept. 30. Stamp No. 83, which provided a five-pound allowance, expired Monday night.

OPA previously had announced that another stamp good for 10 pounds probably would be validated July 1, with a third one likely to be made good around Oct. 1.

However, since Congress ordered sugar controls transferred from OPA to the Agriculture Department effective at midnight, it is possible that some change may be made in this tentative schedule, officials told a reporter.

The Agriculture Department would make any change necessary to conform to new ration rules voted by Congress.

Congress approved extension of sugar and ration controls only until Oct. 31, and stipulated that each person should receive an additional 20 pounds of sugar in the next seven months. This rate would assure 35 pounds for each person this year, compared with a total of 25 pounds received last year.

According to the rules of the contest, the grand prize money is to be invested in government bonds or endowment insurance.

Air Postal Services Now Using Folders

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Post Office Department Tuesday announced a new 10-cent "air letter" stamp, to be used on all airmail letters, effective April 29.

The service calls for the use of air letter sheets, purchasable at postoffices. The thin sheets, measuring 12 by 8½ inches, including a gummed flap, may be folded and sealed after the letter is written into the form of a small envelope.

The folded missive will bear a red-printed 10-cent airmail stamp of the same DC-4 design as the new 5-cent air mail stamp.

Frank L. Armitage, Eugene postmaster, said Tuesday that the airmail sheets would undoubtedly be available at the Eugene post office by April 29.

Forum to Hear General Hale

"The Effects of Polar Routes on Air Power"—a story of the changing patterns of modern warfare dictated by "tomorrow's airplane," will be the theme of an address by Maj. Gen. Willis H. Hale, commanding general of the Fourth Air Force, in his talk to the Chamber of Commerce forum Friday noon at the Eugene Hotel.

Scheduled to occur just before the opening of National Army Week General Hale's appearance was arranged by Col. H. W. Hall, of the Eugene Chamber's military affairs committee. The committee, with Col. O. A. Waller as chairman, is sponsoring Army Week in Eugene, April 6 through 12.

Early Aviator
General Hale became active in aviation early in the 1920's, and was graduated as a pilot from Brooks Field, Texas, in 1923.

A month after Pearl Harbor, General Hale was placed in command of the Seventh Bomber Command, and in June of 1942 he assumed command of the Seventh Air Force. It was during this early stage of the Pacific Air War that the Seventh Air Force was tagged by magazine feature writers "Hale's Handful"—because of the limited number of bombers which could be mustered in forward combat areas at that time.

All Land-Based
By April 1944, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz had placed General Hale in command of all land-based aircraft—Army, Navy and Marine—operating against the Japanese in the forward areas. This command, then known as Com-Air-Forward, later was known by the more familiar title of Strategic Air, involving the same units.

CO's Release Due With Draft's End

PORTLAND — (AP) — Release of 24 conscientious objectors held in Oregon camps will be ordered now that selective service has ended, Col. E. V. Wootton reported Tuesday.

The Oregon selective service director said 40 Oregon men held elsewhere in the country would be released simultaneously.

He reported one man is stationed at the Cascade Locks CPS Camp, four at Waldport, two at Elkton and 17 at Lapine. During the war, 311 Oregon men were classified as objectors. Since, 252 have been released.

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Cordon Leads Budget Hearing

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Coast Guard, given a \$35,904,400 walloping by the House Appropriations Committee which snorted at "grandiose designs," got a chance to carry its case to the Senate Tuesday.

Senator Cordon (R-Ore), chairman of a Senate appropriations sub-committee assigned to the \$3,202,050,750 House bill to finance the Treasury and Postoffice Department for the next fiscal year, planned to turn to the sea-watching arm of the Treasury after another look at Internal Revenue Bureau requirements.

Cordon first called back Joseph D. Numan, Jr., international revenue commissioner, who reported Monday that the House cut of \$30,000,000 in his division would mean a reduction of more than 6000 enforcement officers and an estimated revenue loss of \$600,000,000 to the government.

Cordon said he wanted to be shown. He said he wanted to know whether cuts could not be made elsewhere, rather than concentrating them in the enforcement group.

He added, however, that if Numan can make a case in favor of his contention that the reduction would cost the government money "it would be ridiculous" to pinch the bureau's funds.

Youth Confesses 'Impulse' Shooting

AURORA, Ill. — (AP) — A 16-year-old boy was quoted Tuesday by a prosecutor as saying he shot a telegraph repairman from ambush because "I just wanted to shoot somebody to see him die."

The youth, Ray Glenn Stumbaugh, son of an Aurora factory worker residing in nearby Loveland, was detained without charge for questioning in the shooting of Eugene Garnett, 49, of Chicago.

Garnett, shot in the back by a rifle bullet as he worked alone in his Fox River garage near here Saturday, was reported in critical condition at an Aurora hospital.

Charles G. Seidel, state's attorney, said Stumbaugh in an oral account told authorities he shot Garnett but gave no specific mo-

He said only: "I just wanted to shoot somebody to see him die." Seidel said Stumbaugh was detained after a check of rifles owned by persons in the area showed Stumbaugh's weapon left marks on bullets similar to those found on that which wounded Garnett.
