Economic Warning

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman warned Saturday night in his Jefferson Day banquet address against "false economy."

He said: "If we abandon our work of reclamation, of soil conservation, of preserving our forests, of developing our water resources, we are wasting money, not saving it."

since Robert E. Hannegan, the national party chairman, threw his hat into the ring for 1948.

Mr. Truman, while saying nothing about his plans for the next election, set forth his stand on the prime domestic issues of taxes, spending and prices.

Warns Republicans

He used the occasion, also, to amplify his doctrine of "aiding those peoples whose freedoms are endangered by foreign pressure," declared that "our foreign policy must not be wrecked on the rocks of partisanship," and commended both Democrats and Republicans who have supported it.

"We, like Jefferson, have witnessed atrocious violations of the rights of nations," he said.

"We, too, have regarded them as occasions not to be slighted."

"We, too, have declared our protest."

The President did not mention Russia directly, but he significantly compared his present course to that of President Monroe, whose Monroe Doctrine was aimed partly at Russian claims in Alaska.

"Tax Cuts Premature"

Neither did he refer to the Republicans by name, but he lashed out at the economies they have voted and their plans for tax reduction now. Mr. Truman said, however, that he will support tax reduction "at a proper time."

He spoke before some 2000 party bigwigs at the \$100-a-plate dinner.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland.—(AP)—Mount Hekla, which burst unexpectedly into eruption one week ago Saturday after 102 years of inactivity, has spread approximately 35,000,000 cubic feet of molten lava over an area of nearly four square miles.

Cordon Says Disaster Due to Negligence

CENTRALIA, Ill.—(AP)—Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.), chairman of the Senate sub-committee investigating the Centralia mine disaster, asserted Saturday that it was caused by "gross negligence."

He said that two days of testimony by state and federal mine inspectors, company officials and others showed that negligence was responsible for the death of the 111 miners who perished.

Cordon added, however, that the sub-committee still must determine who was responsible.

would have no jurisdiction in equity cases or cases involving real estate. It would, however, have jurisdiction in foreclosures and collections of small sums against personal property.

Docket a Public Record

The County Clerk would be the ex-officio clerk of the District Court and the docket will be a matter of public record.

Judge Bryson said that the Eugene Bar Assn. recently discussed and approved of the bill while it was still in the Senate.

A jury of six members may be drawn from the Circuit Court panel when demanded in writing five days before the date set for trial.
