

## CCC Camp Said Step Toward Better Juvenile Work

Oregon has moved a step closer toward a corrective institution for boys which is not a penitentiary stone to the penitentiary building in the CCC camp at Timber, Ore., said Judge Skipworth called a stepping stone to the penitentiary.

He could not be sent back there because of his record, and the court pointed out that the state is at fault in such cases because it had no intermediate type of corrective institution.

The bill for the new institution was supported by the Oregon

State Prison Assn. of which J. R. Parsons, assistant professor of sociology at the university, is a vice-president. As amended, it would appropriate \$50,000 for remodeling buildings at the camp and \$100,000 to operate it until June 30, 1949. The place is now known as Reeder's CCC Camp.

**Psychiatric Tests**  
Courts could send there boys who came before them, from 12 to 18 years of age. They would be examined on arrival by a psychiatrist. Prof. Parsons pointed out that some boys now at Woodburn might be eligible for the proposed new institution and that boys who did not make good there could be sent to Woodburn.

Boys sent to the camp at Timber would be those who appeared to have possibilities of rehabilitation. The place would be administered under the State Board of Control.

**Would Work**  
The camp would be set up to provide training, discipline and spiritual instruction, academic and vocational education. So far as practical the boys would be instructed in practical operation of the camp, farming, gardening, building of trails and firebreaks, would be required to do the necessary chores and, as far as possible, make the camp self-sustaining but not to the extent that this would jeopardize their education.

When Judge Skipworth sentenced the 17-year-old boy last January and criticized the failure to provide such a corrective institution, he said:

"It's outrageous. We should have a modern reformatory which would give industrial or shop training and emphasize character-building."

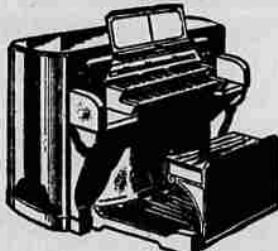

## Housing Rule Still Applies

Persons who are contemplating the erection of summer cottages or other seasonal housing structures this year were reminded Saturday by Charles Bayles, locality housing expediter, Eugene, that such construction is not permitted under the Veterans Housing program.

"A acute housing shortage continues to exist," Bayles said. "Until there is an adequate supply of building materials on the market to construct the year-round houses needed by veterans and others, it would not be fair to permit a drain on scarce supplies to build luxury and recreational type housing."

Bayles pointed out also that the recent transfer of CPA construction functions to the Office of the Housing Expediter has not changed the regulations requiring approval of non-residential construction. Permits for residential construction are issued by FHA offices.

### Vandals Harm Motor By Sugaring Gas Tank

C. M. Bryan, 856 Lincoln St., said Saturday that the motor of his 1947 Chevrolet coupe was seriously damaged and possibly ruined by vandals who put sugar in the gas tank Friday night.

Bryan told police his car was parked across the street from his home, and that he drove it to a service station at Eleventh and Charnelton Sts. before sugar was discovered on the edge of the cover. A similar incident occurred at Eugene Airport about two weeks ago.

## Attorney General To Study Price Hike

SACRAMENTO—(AP)—United States Attorney General Tom Clark has promised to investigate charges by Governor Earl Warren that California oil companies have violated federal anti-trust laws, the governor's office announced Saturday.

Warren wrote Clark asking an investigation after the major California oil companies announced an .8 cent increase in the retail price of gasoline.

The governor charged at the time that the price increase was a "political move," aimed at defeating his administration's highway bill which is now being debated in the assembly.

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## Bank Begins Building Work

Scaffolding outside the First National Bank of Eugene building marks the beginning of the bank's latest program of expansion. The entire second floor of the two-story structure, heretofore occupied by other firms, will be converted to the bank's use.

O. A. Houghum, chairman of the board, said that the top floor would be remodeled so as to accommodate the bookkeeping department, auditing, trust department, and rest rooms. In addition, architects are planning a recreation and lounge room for employees.

The scaffolding is a workmen's elevator for conveying cement and building materials to the roof where it is to be used in the construction of an elevator inside the building. The building elevator, an Otis self-operating model, will connect the basement with

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the second floor.  
Houghum indicated that the plans were still in the hands of the architects and that the net result of all changes would be a bigger main lobby for customers and greater service.
