Welfare Percentage Increase Explained

the figure dropped to 32 per cent but climbed back in 1939 to 38 per cent of the amount spent by the county.

By 1944, however, when the war boom was on, general assistance represented only 18 per cent of the county welfare budget. This year it represents only 14 per cent.

Old Age Benefits
As amounts for general assistance have declined, the amounts spent for old age assistance naturally have represented larger percentages of the whole budgets.

The case load in this branch of the program has not varied as much as in general assistance. Old age assistance in 1938 represented 55 per cent of the county welfare budget. In 1937 it was 51 per cent and in 1939 it was 50.5 per cent. In 1939 it represented 39 per cent of the amount spent by the county for welfare.

The percentage started climbing in 1940, and by 1944 had reached 72 per cent. In 1945 the general assistance figure dropped almost to the vanishing point in the budget—0.17 per cent—and the old age assistance represented 83 per cent of the total welfare budget. It declined to 82 per cent in 1946 when general assistance rose to 23 per cent, but rose again to 71 per cent in 1947, as general assistance declined to 14 per cent.

County budgets for welfare, which declined to their lowest point of the last decade, in 1944 when the figure was about \$100,000, started climbing in 1945, and this year the budget is \$189,000. But the figure has been in that neighborhood before. Back in 1938 it was \$153,000.

Bullet Ends Life Of Father of Eight

PORTLAND (AP)—Arthur Richard Voeks, 48, father of eight children, was fatally wounded Monday night by a .22 caliber bullet as a sheriff's deputy said was fired by James K. Treccarten, 22.

Deputy Sheriff Dave McMillen, who witnessed the shooting while investigating a report of prowlers, said Voeks was smashing through the door of the Treccarten apartment when he was shot.

Voeks returned from the Aleutians two weeks ago after serving with the Army Engineers. The report of prowlers was made by Treccarten's mother, the deputy said.

Pilot Hits Own Car With Brakeless Plane
CHICAGO (AP)—Frank Hlavazek, Chicago florist and charter pilot, made a three-point landing in his small airplane at Sky Harbor Airport here.

When he tried to bring the plane to a stop, the brakes failed and the ship crashed into a parked automobile. Both machines were damaged badly.

Hlavazek jumped out of the plane uninjured and discovered the automobile was his own.

Just as amazed was Bert J. Dickens, an insurance salesman and witness of the accident. He wrote the insurance on both machines.

Depression Seen Threat

PORTLAND (AP)—America "need never fear Communism" if it eliminates the suffering and hardship of periodic depressions, Sen. Glenn Taylor (D-Idaho) believes.

In a speech prepared for a Jackson Club dinner Monday night, the senator said that "a depression can create more Communists overnight than the Republican witch hunters could track down in a month of Sundays."

Although he planned to deliver the speech personally, the senator was grounded by weather at Cleveland on his plane trip West and the address was read to the Oregon Democratic banquet by Richard L. Neuberger, Jackson Club president.

"The cure for Communism, like the cure for anything else," Sen. Taylor's speech said, "is prevention. If we do not eliminate these horrible hardships, then we have no one to blame for the rebirth of Communism but the Republican Party which will have helped it."

A telegram from Sheldon F. Sackett, Northwest publisher and radio station operator, informed the club of his plans to expand his newspaper enterprise to papers in Spokane, Wash., and Boise, Ida.

Prevented by business and personal affairs from attending the banquet, Sackett asked President Neuberger to tell of his expansion plans. He recently purchased the Seattle Star and has announced he will enter the daily newspaper field in Portland.

Troubles Dog Navy Carrier in Pacific

PEARL HARBOR (AP)—Misfortune dogged the cruise of the carrier Shangri La from California to Hawaii, with the Navy reporting one flyer killed and four others escaping injury in three separate plane mishaps en route.

The Shangri La and USS Anietam arrived here Monday to relieve the carriers Princeton and Tarawa.

Ensign Kent R. Johnson, 21, West Hartford, Conn., was killed Saturday when his Curtiss Helldiver plunged into the sea and burned as the pilot rendezvoused over the carrier 450 miles east of Honolulu.

Ensign Stuart Jay Denson, Susquehanna, Penn., was forced to ditch his Helldiver in the ocean due to engine trouble half an hour earlier. Denson and a crewman were rescued.

The third accident occurred Tuesday morning when a catapult mechanism failed, tossing a plane into the sea. The pilot, Lieut. Orin N. Ford, Salinas, Cal., and a crewman were rescued.

Vancouver Barracks Returns to Services
VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—Vancouver Barracks was flying the red, white and blue again Tuesday as headquarters of Oregon area Organized Reserve training units.

Brig. Gen. Frederick McCabe directed the re-activating ceremony Monday as part of Army Day observance and turned the area over to Col. G. D. Wahl, senior instructor of Oregon reserve units.

Only a limited part of the barracks area is included and Army officers said use by the reserve units would not interfere with plans of the city of Vancouver to build streets through the former military property.

Death Takes 'Santa Claus'

SANTA CLAUS, Ind. (AP)—Oscar L. Phillips, 87, the "Santa Claus" of Santa Claus, Ind., died Saturday.

As postmaster for the past 12 years in this little Spencer County village, Phillips answered letters to Santa from thousands of children each Christmas season.

He died in his home a few hours after suffering a heart seizure.

Phillips took over as postmaster in 1935 after the death of James Martin, the ruddy-faced, jolly man who first earned the title of "the St. Nicholas of Santa Claus, Ind."

Previously, he had been a blacksmith, a farmer and an employee of the state highway department.

During most of the year, Phillips had little to do. He kept the office alone except for the rush months of November and December, when the volume of mail totaled as high as 4,500,000 pieces, including Christmas cards and gift packages, sent here to be mailed with the famous "Santa Claus" postmark.

Phillips and the American Legion cooperated in a plan to answer every letter addressed to "Santa Claus," which postal authorities the U. S. over directed to the village post office. They sent a form reply for each letter bearing a return address.

Kick-Off Planned For Work on Dam

UMATILLA, Ore. (AP)—A great celebration kicking off construction of the \$180,000,000 McNary Dam on the Columbia River near Umatilla will be held here April 15.

Cornelia Morton McNary, widow of Oregon Senator Charles McNary, will fly to Umatilla from the national capital to take part in the ceremony. She will turn the first spadeful of earth on the project.

Mrs. McNary will be aided in the dedication ceremony by Janis Paige, Warner Bros. motion picture star, who will come here from Hollywood to take part in the celebration as "Miss Damsite."
