Cuts Hospitalization
CHICAGO—The shortage
 of nurses and other hospital per-
 sonnel has resulted in the closing
 of more than 32,000 hospital beds
 to the public, the American Hospi-
 tal Assn. said Tuesday.
 The association added that the
 survey disclosed an average of 15-
 600 patients a day were unable to
 obtain admission to the nation's
 general hospitals.
