Mrs. V. Grey and daughter of Coos Bay, and Charlie Sharon of Eugene, are visiting their brother, William Sharon and family.

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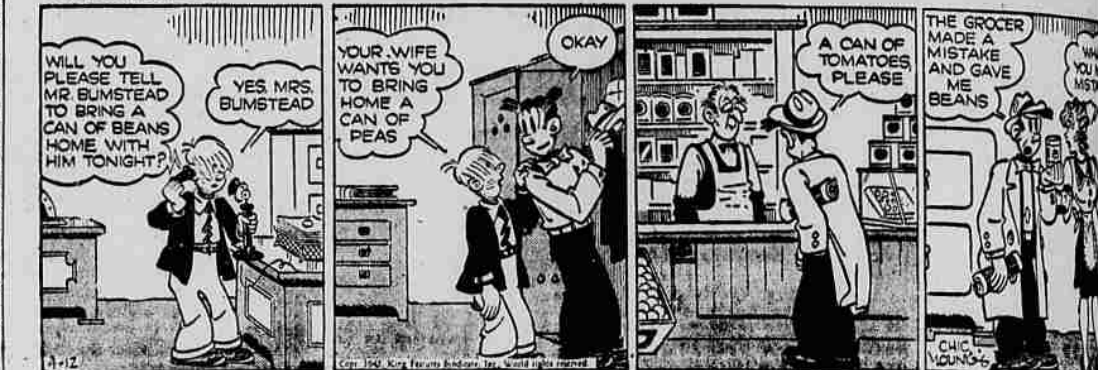
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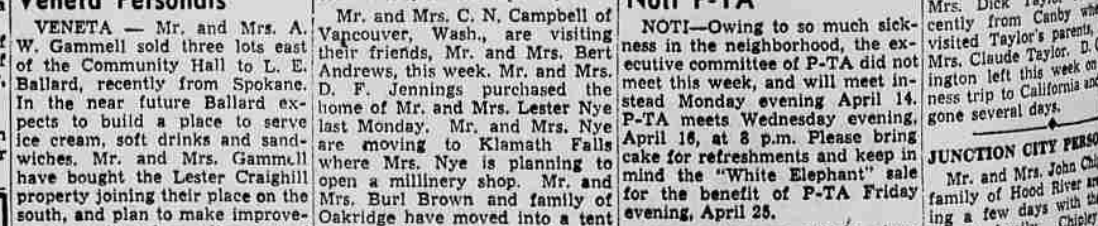


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VENETA PERSONALS
