Mrs. Morris Tells Life of Jefferson At BPW Meeting

Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States, whose birthday is today, was eulogized by Mrs. Victor P. Morris in a biographical sketch given before the Eugene Business and Professional Women's Club Thursday at the club's monthly luncheon in the Osburn Hotel.

Jefferson, renowned as the founder of the Democratic party, purchaser of the Louisiana territory and promoter of the Lewis and Clark expedition, was shown by the speaker to have possessed many other remarkable points. His record of service to his country shows that he served as a member of the House of Virginia Burgesses with Washington; also in the continental Congress, where he helped to draft and signed the Declaration of Independence; served as minister to France; was governor of Virginia after Patrick Henry; served in the Virginia militia during the Revolution; was Secretary of State under Washington; vice president under John Adams; elected President in 1800, and re-elected in 1804.

Famous Phrase
It was Jefferson who wrote into the Declaration of Independence the phrase, "the pursuit of happiness" as one of man's inalienable rights, the speaker said. She related many incidents illustrative of his great breadth of interest, which embraced architecture, invention, music and education, as well as statesmanship. He was an accomplished violinist. He founded the University of Virginia, and laid the foundation for free education in public schools, although this did not come about until a hundred years later. He was a lover of gadgets, and invented many.

She quoted him as saying: "It is a part of the American character to consider nothing as desperate and to surmount every difficulty by resolution and contrivance."

Mrs. Morris was introduced by the program chairman, Miss Kay Godley. Miss Elizabeth Richard presided at the luncheon, as president. Mrs. Max Burris, as chairman of the Park and Playground Committee, reported on the campaign, and introduced W. M. Tugman, who gave a resume of progress in the drive for park funds.
