

Need of Schools For More Money Told to Council

Need of funds for city schools was brought out at the luncheon meeting of the Eugene Council of Women's Organizations at the Osburn Hotel Friday noon. Mrs. L. B. Schmidt, president, introduced Clarence Hines, city superintendent of schools, who discussed the coming school election April 24. He said the number of children in Eugene schools has so increased, and classes are getting so large, that it is necessary for the school board to have more funds to meet the situation. He stated that Eugene schools have an excellent reputation, and in order to maintain present standards, the board is asking for \$315,000 over the budget. Only taxpayers whose names appear on the tax rolls or who may own stock in certain corporations, are eligible to vote in this election.
