It's for the kids, sure, but it's also for future generations that will probably wonder at the group of persons who had the foresight to secure for a park and playground such a centrally-located and ideal tract of land for recreation purposes. We're speaking of the Amazon Park Area and its 120 acres, sponsors of the project hope to have signed, sealed and delivered by the end of the current week.

Sure, and we've been "milked" by campaigns, but none of them have been of the gilt edge variety and attractiveness of the present Century Fund Parks and Playgrounds. The \$50,000 sought will be the best \$50,000 ever expended in the city of Eugene.

Business and professional men contacted during the past week have given willingly, overlooking demands made on them by other agencies during the past few months. And when the P-TA house-to-house campaigners call on friend wife during the coming week, put her wise and tell her to dig beyond the sugar bowl to help fill the coffers.

Saturday was the 41st birthday for the National Recreation Association, founded in 1906 by President Teddy Roosevelt, a fellow who rates along with Babe Ruth, Jack Dempsey, Bobby Jones, and Red Grange as a "champion".

When the NRA was organized only 41 cities in the nation could boast of playgrounds under adult leadership. Last year every state in the nation and 25 foreign countries had 6000 communities with organized playground work.

We happen to know the importance of supervised recreation with adequate facilities. During our eight years as a YMCA physical director, part of which was in Manhattan and Brooklyn boroughs of New York City, the importance of playgrounds and recreation was brought to mind with considerable force.

Eugene is not a metropolitan area, but it is quickly growing in both population and recreation needs. The Amazon Park Area is the "last frontier" for us to develop as a guarantee for physical development of our youth and a guarantee against juvenile delinquency.

Dick Bishop, assistant juvenile officer, told us the other day he had found a group of boys recently who could find nothing better to do than to hitch-hike from Eugene to Junction City and return. With supervised playground work, such activities could be diverted into constructive development.

If the necessary financial support is given to the current Century Fund campaign, the city's new recreation program under the newly-appointed director, Don January, will give Eugene the leadership and the facilities.

We hope that eventually there can be a community center constructed on the Amazon Park Area to provide winter recreation for the kids and young men—basketball, boxing, wrestling, gymnastics.

The schools have been very cooperative in allowing the community use of its facilities during the off hours, but the many school activities conflict with the needs of an adequate winter recreation program.

Remember, when someone comes knocking at your door for financial support to the Century Fund Parks and Playgrounds this week, give generously. It's for the kids—your kids, the neighborhood kids, the kids of the future, and for you!

Initial appointment under Oregon's new program for strengthening its coaching staff is expected soon, and we understand the first addition will be Don Kirsch, former Webfoot baseball and basketball player and now Hillsboro High coach, who will become assistant varsity basketball and baseball coach. . . . There will also be a freshman coach of all sports with John A. Warren becoming a regular member of Jim Aiken's football staff. He will also continue his physical education work and swimming and track coaching. . . .

We understand that Colonel Bill Hayward, a potential champion in Dave Henthorne, the Klamath Falls freshman who wanted to run all of the sprints, the 440 and take part in the broad jump. . . . The 145-pound ex-sailor is rated best in the quarter mile. . . . The grapevine has it that Laddie Gale, former All-American hoopster with Oregon's 1939 NCAA champions and more recently coach and star for the Salt Lake City team in the American Basketball League, will return to Oakridge High as basketball coach. . . . Gale was an all-stater at Oakridge in 1935.

Vern Likens, NCAA champion from San Jose, tossed the javelin 193 feet for one of the best marks of the meet; and Larry Hoff, Stanford freshman turned the quarter mile in 49 seconds flat.

Webfoot Track Team Defeats Idaho Vandals, 79-53

Wright Paces Oregon Victory

Colonel Bill Hayward's University of Oregon trackmen displayed power in the sprints and jumps Saturday as they downed the Idaho Vandals, 79-53, at Hayward field. It was the first Northern Division dual meet of the season for both teams.

Win Wright of the Webfoots captured high point honors as he won both hurdle events and took second in the high jump for a total of 13 points. Freshman Dave Henthorne, also of the Webfoots, was close behind with 11½ points—first in the 100-yard dash, the quarter-mile, and the anchor lap of the winning mile relay team.

The Ducks jumped into the lead on the first event of the afternoon the 100-yard dash, and were never headed. Henthorne and Jake Leicht hit the tape in a photo finish after Leicht had tied up in the final ten yards. Henthorne was declared the winner with a time of 10.1.

Henthorne came back to win the 440-yard dash with comparative ease in the good early season time of 50.5, while Leicht was the only Oregon entry in the 220, winning with eight yards to spare at 22.3.

Idaho displayed strength in the distance events sweeping the two-mile and allowing Oregon a third in the mile and a second in the 880.

Art Humphrey stepped off a 4:28.4 mile as he finished without being pressed. Ward Stroschein likewise had little difficulty in the two-mile as he chalked up a 10:04.2 race.

Norman Farnham of Idaho and Webfoot Stu Norene staged a bitter dual in the 880 with the Vandal taking an early lead and holding it throughout. He had five-yard advantage as he turned into the final stretch, and then Norene began his kick. Slowly he pulled up, but it was too late as Farnham hit the tape with a yard to spare at 1:59.9.

The Ducks swept the high jump as Bill Beifuss cleared 6 feet 4 inches. He was followed by Wright and Merc Brown.

The green-shirted Webfoots hit one-two in the high jump and pole vault. George Rasmussen cleared 12 feet 9 inches with his freshman running-mate Don Pickens picking up a second.

Pickens then moved to the broad jump pit where he came off with top honors at 21 feet 3½ inches. Skiles Hoffman contributed a second for the Ducks just an inch behind.

Big Lou Robinson chalked up one of the best marks of the afternoon when he tossed the javelin beyond the 200-foot mark on two different occasions. He fouled on his best heave, however, and was credited with a winning toss of 201 feet 6½ inches.

Wright ambled to an easy 10-yard win in the low hurdles in the slow time of 28.4. The high hurdle event was closer with Idaho contending for the lead until both entries stumbled and fell midway in the event.

The Webfoots completed the afternoon in decisive fashion as Jake Leicht, Stu Norene, Hal White and Henthorne combined in the relay event for a 3:27.9 mile.

Oregon Nine Opens Northern Division Season Against Idaho Vandals Here

The opening Northern Division, Pacific Coast Conference baseball series and the 10th annual Hayward Relays will headline a heavy University of Oregon sports program during the coming week.

Oregon's defending champions open their pennant campaign against the Idaho Vandals on Howe Field Friday and Saturday with a warmup doubleheader booked against Willamette University here Tuesday afternoon.

Coach Guy Wicks has a Vandal squad that includes nine lettermen and a group of freshmen with unusual talent, including John Robinson, Payette pitcher who handcuffed the Bremerton WIL club and blanked Whitman College 1-0 in his first two starts. There may be as many as six yearling starters in the Vandal lineup.

The Hayward Relays, expected to attract some 50 schools and 700 prep athletes from every section of the state, will be held Friday and Saturday, the "A" schools on Friday and the "B" and "C" divisions Saturday.

Michigan Trackmen Top Bears, 71½-59

BERKELEY, Cal., April 12.—(U.P.)—University of Michigan's versatile track and field team defeated University of California, 71½ to 59½, in the first intersectional meet of the season here Saturday in sweltering weather.

Coach Kenneth Doherty's Wolverines, won 10 first to the five by the Golden Bears, despite the fact that the Michigan squad was composed of only 16 athletes.

The victory evened the 26-year-old series between the two schools at two wins each.

In their five wins, the California team set four new meet records, with the outstanding performance being Don Anderson's 100-yard dash mark of 9.6 seconds. This broke a mark set by his brother, George, against Michigan in 1935.
