Egypt Reported Seeking U S Loan

CAIRO, Egypt.—The Washington correspondent of the weekly publication Akbar el Yom reported Saturday that Egypt had asked the United States for a loan of \$100,000,000.

The dispatch said that Egypt wanted the loan to complete its gold backing for the nation's currency and proposed to repay it within 15 years. Egypt's circulating currency amounts to \$560,000,000 but it is backed by gold amounting to only \$52,000,000.

International regulations agree that gold cover for a country's currency should be at least one quarter of paper currency. Under that yardstick, Egypt needs at least \$38,000,000 more in gold.

The publication, which supports Premier Mahmoud Famy Nokrashy Pasha, said that in the event the loan went through, Egyptian currency would be free for world-wide circulation.

"This is another step toward our economic freedom," Akbar el Yom said.

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Friends of UO Aim to Raise \$600,000 for Memorial Union

Friends and alumni of the University of Oregon throughout the nation are being called upon to support the Erb Memorial Union appeal through a widespread organization headed by Ernest Haycox, alumni president and national chairman.

The objective of the appeal will be to raise \$600,000. State, county, and city groups will be assigned various goals in the effort to subscribe this minimum objective within a limited period.

Separate campaigns are being set up in Portland, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Washington, D. C., New York City, Honolulu, and elsewhere. There will be an intensive campaign in every section of Oregon.

\$200,000 Goal for Lane
Under the chairmanship of William N. Russell, president of Russell's store, the University's home county will be expected to raise at least \$200,000 of the total. Plans call for the construction of a \$1,300,000. Student Union building. The state board of higher education has authorized a bond issue for \$600,000 of this amount. Additional funds of \$100,000, have accumulated as a result of campus campaigns since 1923.

Among local leaders who will assist in the appeal are Ben Dorris, advance gifts; Loy Rowling, trade and industry groups; C. R. Manerud, general sales; Mrs. J. Don Smith, women; and Dean Karl Onthank, Richard Williams, and Wallace Johnson, University campus.

The county appeal outside Eugene will be carried to 21 geographical districts. Springfield and the eastern part of the county are being organized under the leadership of Fred Konschot, Cottage Grove. The southern part of the county will be under Sidney Milligan.

Initiated by Erb
Six generations of Oregon students have recognized the need and voiced an appeal for a Student Union building.

The late president Donald M. Erb initiated the movement that is now being pushed to completion. At the suggestion of President H. K. Newburn and many others the structure will be known as the Erb Memorial Union. It will be located in an area bounded on the east by Onyx Street; on the north by 13th; on the west by University

Street and on the south by 15th. Those in charge of the plans have made an exhaustive study of similar Unions on campuses from coast to coast. Their proposals will cater to a wide variety of student needs. There will be a bag lunch room and private dining halls; a game room and music listening rooms; a lounge and a browsing library; offices for all student activities, a post office, a bank, and a co-op store; a cafeteria, soda bar and an art lounge; a large hall so equipped that as occasion demands it may be used as a ballroom, theatre, banquet room or auditorium.

Stocks Decline To Year's Low

NEW YORK (AP) Stocks this week suffered their sharpest relapse in better than six months and hit a new average low since early in December in the broadest and liveliest Saturday market since March 8.

Selling in the final session, relatively heavy for an interval, dropped leading steels, motors, rails and industrial fractions to 2 points. From Monday on, with the exception of a slight recovery Thursday, liquidation was blamed mainly on the stalemate telephone strike, chances of a walkout in the steel field at the end of April, generally confusing wage-price situations and doubts regarding business prospects and tax relief.

Extreme declines were reduced in the majority of cases at the close. Transfers of 630,000 shares compared with 270,000 a week ago. For the six sessions the aggregate was 4,663,490, largest since the period concluded March 15. In the preceding five-day week the total was 3,120,490, a low since Oct. 14, 1944.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off 7 of a point at 62.7 on the day, a bottom since last Dec. 3. For the week the drop was 2.4 points, which was the widest retreat since the period of last Sept. 20. Both the rail and utilities indexes recorded new lows.

Mother Effects Self-Delivery Of Twin Girls

LIBERTY, MO.—(AP)—Her physician ordered her to bed for what he termed a "well-earned rest" Saturday but petite Mrs. Theda Pearson fretted to "be about my housework" after the untended birth of pre-mature twin daughters.

The 24-year-old, 100-pound wife of a north Kansas City laborer, Walter Pearson, 46, delivered herself of the infants in the living room of their farm home near here late Thursday afternoon.

When the husband returned from work he found his wife sitting on a daybed in the living room peeling potatoes for supper, the twins, Carolyn Sue, five pounds, and Marilyn Lou, 3 1/2 pounds, wrapped in blankets beside her. They had been born two hours previously.

Pearson was met by his two sons, who told him as he approached the house, "We got a lot of little sisters."

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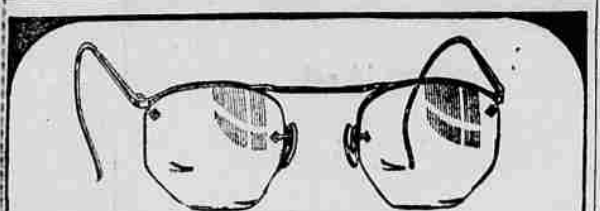
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
