Eugene High, St. Mary's Give Evidence of Musical Talents

The annual recital of St. Mary's School of Music, presented Friday evening, was an indication of the varied and successful musical activities of the school.

The music students who participated are a versatile lot. Fifteen of them played in the string orchestra which opened the program. Most of these appeared later as soloists or small-ensemble members, frequently with a different instrument. Most solo pianists doubled as accompanists. And all the musicians joined for the three closing choral selections.

Good Work
Performances on the whole were notable for precision, control, and carefully correct interpretation. Pianists' technique was clear, singers had excellent diction and universally good pianissimi. So correct were the readings, however, that they lost spontaneity. A warm burst of tone, something less perfect but more original, would have added life to the program.

Among pianists, Suzanne Cable, acting as accompanist for singer Ione Fulton, proved herself extremely capable. Gloria Chellis, soprano who sang "Musetta's Waltz" from "La Boheme" and Purcell's "Nymphs and Shepherds," has a rich voice which she uses with considerable skill.

Four music groups of Eugene High School surpassed the usual high school level of performance in the annual spring concert presented Friday evening at McArthur Court. Each was outstanding in its field.

The orchestra, directed by Byron Miller, played a rhythmic overture, "Three Brothers," by Cimmaroso; a gay Mozart number, "Suite for Strings," and a medley of regional American folksongs by Grossman.

Girls Perform
The girls' glee club gave exquisite performances of two well-chosen numbers, "My Heart is a Silent Violin" (Fox-Andrews) and "Children of the Moon" (Adams-Warren), under Mrs. Thelma Landes' capable direction.

First number played by band, also directed by Miller, was a spirited march, "The Royal Husars" (King). Outstanding was the second, "Landsighting," by Grieg, which was almost symphonic in its deep harmonies. The group showed fine handling. Their closing number, the finale from Tschaiakowsky's Fourth Symphony, demanded much of young players, but they delivered a very creditable rendition.

Choir Sings
Last to appear was the huge a cappella choir of mixed voices, directed by Glenn Griffith. They sang a Russian liturgical number, "Now Rejoice Oh My Soul" (Balakireff), and "Lost in the Night" (Christiansen), following these with a group of spirituals.

The Christiansen number was a gem, and the solo by Rose Young, promising young soprano, was pleasing. Of the spirituals, "Set Down, Servant," was a novel and exciting thing. Jeanne Gibson, Don Stringfield and Bob Mention were other soloists.
