COTTAGE GROVE—The city planning commission, H. E. Eakin, chairman, has recently completed a tentative ordinance which the members have worked on for the past year and hope to place before the voters soon.

Incorporated in the document is the plan to divide the city into five districts for building: residence, limited commercial, business, industrial, and public land. Any building or land owned within the city limits would in the future be subject to the zoning ordinance.

The ordinance defines the districts at length, specifying the kind of buildings and size requirements to be in each zone, with expectancy for up-keep and other details.

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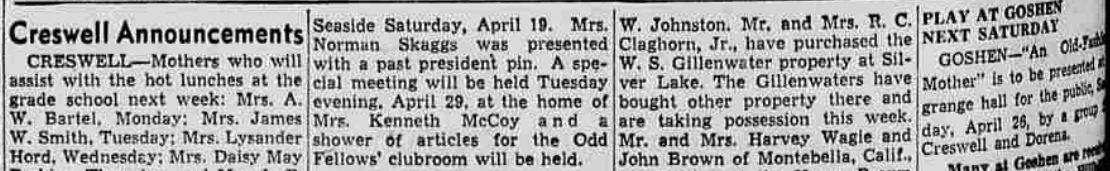
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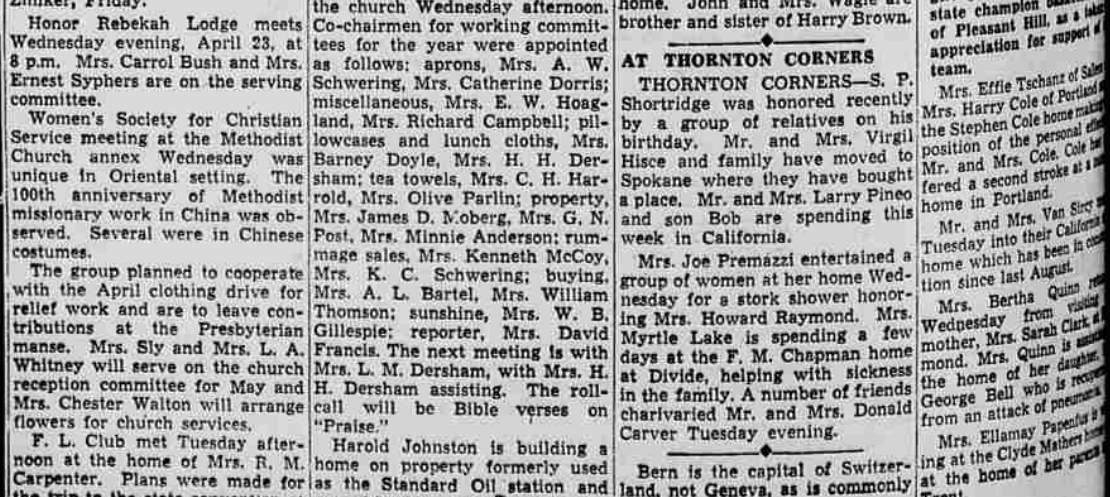
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PLAY AT GOSHEN NEXT SATURDAY
