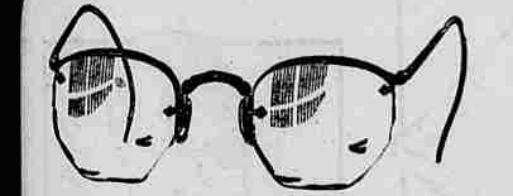
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City Studies Zoning Plan

SPRINGFIELD—An ordinance designed to modernize zoning regulations by expanding the business district and increasing the number of different property zones was reported ready for the city council after a planning commission meeting here Monday night.

The ordinance was drawn by Howard Buford, planning consultant for the Central Lane Planning Council, and is similar to one proposed for Eugene. Provisions of the ordinance include increasing the types of residential and building zones by a greater breakdown in kinds of construction allowed, requiring set-backs along highway property, and requiring off-street parking in some cases.

Off-street parking will be required when new businesses are built, where the number of customers' cars ordinarily attracted would exceed the amount of street frontage.

Provisions of the ordinance will be reviewed at public hearings. The planning commission has indicated that it would hold a hearing before turning the plan over to the city council. W. S. Fort, a member of the commission, has said that the group hopes to make any necessary revisions to meet individual cases at this preliminary meeting and thus expedite approval of the ordinance.

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Lumber Firm Given Permit

The Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. Tuesday was given the go-ahead on construction of living quarters for sawmill workers at their 450-acre mill site east of Springfield.

The Oregon office of the Housing Expediter approved \$56,000 for the job, according to the Associated Press.

Disease and Insects Destroy Most Timber

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Forest losses to insects and diseases are double those of fire, a House agriculture subcommittee heard Tuesday from R. E. Marsh, assistant chief of the Forest Service.

He estimated the annual loss to insects and diseases at 1,900,000, 000 board feet, compared with 900,000,000 destroyed by fire.

Under a bill by Rep. Goff (R-Idaho) being considered by the committee, the federal and state governments and private owners would share the cost of the program.

Richard A. Colgan, Jr., representing the National Lumber Manufacturing Assn., said the western pine beetle destroyed an estimated 15,445,000 board feet last year, and the Douglas fir beetle one per cent of the standing timber.

Husky Baby Sitter Finds Boys Tough

BOSTON—(AP)—Boston's huskiest baby sitter is George Ramacorti, a 235-pound tackle on the Boston University football team.

Ramacorti, a former day laborer and bomb loader for the army, said those boys weren't bad at all, "but this baby-sitting is really a tough one."

"They frighten me stiff," he said. "The little ones, I mean. I'm afraid when I pick them up they'll break in two."

Ramacorti finds little girls easier to handle than boys.

"The little girls only want you to tell them a story when they go to sleep just as nice as you please," he said. "But the boys—oh, golly! They really can kick up a fuss. As soon as they hear I'm a football player, they want to get down with me on the floor and try out a few tackles or blocks."

Sheriff Reports Three Crimes

The county sheriff's office Tuesday was working on three cases of breaking and entering reported Monday. Deputy W. G. Romaine had several leads on the early morning looting of El Capitlan, a suburban night club, from which an estimated \$87 in nickles and dimes was stolen.

The state police were aiding the investigation of the night club robbery. Early indications were that the bandits entered through a side window and used candles for light while they pried open a cigarette vending machine, a record player, and a pin-ball machine. The cash register had been emptied earlier by the management when the establishment closed for the night.

A partially eaten pie and an empty whiskey bottle were found in the club's kitchen.

Monday night vandals broke into Bethel School and left the place in disorder, but no valuables were reported stolen.

Central Grange reported early Tuesday morning that prowlers had broken into the building during the night and done some damage. Estimates of loss were not available at the time of the report.

The sheriff's office sent deputies to Bethel and Central Tuesday and continued investigation of last week's Montgomery Ward robbery in which some \$8000 in jewelry and other goods were stolen.

Fluorescent Money Prove Cop's Undoing

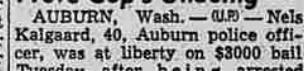
AUBURN, Wash.—(AP)—Nels Kalgaard, 40, Auburn police officer, was at liberty on \$3000 bail Tuesday after being arrested Monday night on charges of stealing funds collected from city parking meters.

Kalgaard was accused in an information filed by Deputy Prosecutor Duane T. Shinn accusing the former Seattle private detective of stealing money in excess of \$25.

Sheriff's Chief of Detectives G. H. Lohrer said marked money was found in Kalgaard's possession. He also said the money had been treated with fluorescent material, and that Kalgaard had some of the material on his hands when taken into custody.

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Farmer Sues for Loss Of Cow-Shading Tree

MOUNT VERNON, Wash.—(AP)—Cows, trees and airplanes were involved in a suit filed by farmer Lee Heberling of Burlington, Wash., in Skagit County Superior Court here Monday.

Heberling is asking \$1050 from

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the Skagit Valley Air Service, charging the operators cut down a gnarled maple tree that sheltered cattle for many years on the farmer's property.

The air service said the tree was a hazard to fliers using the nearby field.
