

House Slash Gets Criticism

Andrew J. Naterlin, president of the Central Lincoln Peoples' Utility District board, Thursday criticized sharply the action of the national House of Representatives in reducing the Bonneville appropriation for the Eugene-Mapleton-Reedsport-Coos Bay line from \$1,408,300 to \$868,000.

He stated in letters to Sens. Guy Cordon and Wayne Morse that the House action made it impossible for Bonneville to construct the Eugene-Mapleton section of the line and have sufficient funds remaining for installation of line connection facilities at Eugene and the necessary high voltage substation at Mapleton.

If the appropriation stands the district will be forced to install its own substation at Mapleton. Bonneville had estimated the cost of this substation at \$265,000. Bonneville and the district had planned upon energizing the facilities to Mapleton by Dec. 1, 1948, if the original request were allowed.

Timber Firm Reports Plan

SPRINGFIELD—Contracts for a 58-acre millpond and the grading of a millsite for the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. plant here are expected to be let within the next 30 days, the company announced Thursday.

J. R. Titcomb, local representative, reported that plans for the sawmill have progressed to a point where actual operation is scheduled for early in 1949.

The pioneer Washington timber firm owns 450 acres of industrial property east of here, and last fall set up an office on the site to begin preliminary work. Housing for key personnel, now under construction on the millsite, is expected to be available in late June.

The Lloyd M. Hill Co., Inc., of Salem, recently was awarded a contract for 20 miles of logging road into the Little Fall Creek area. The road is being constructed by Weyerhaeuser and the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co.

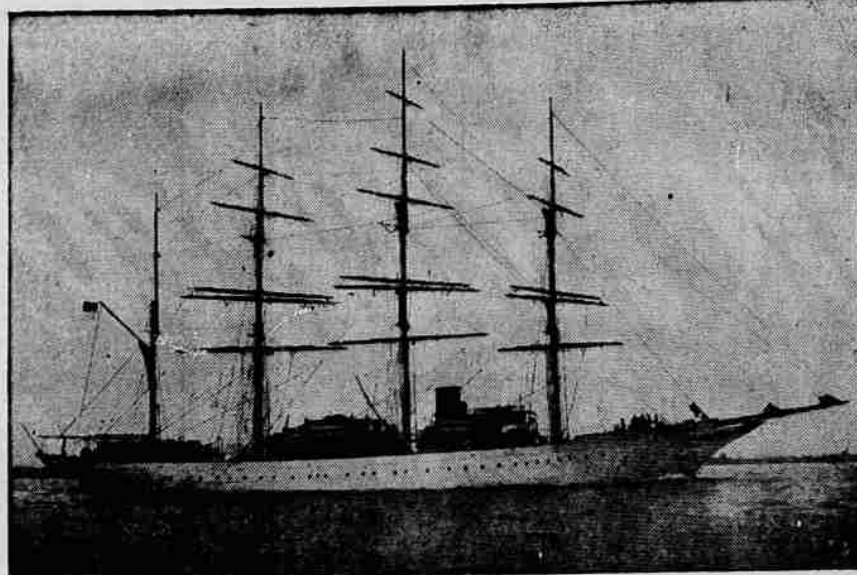
Tuesday the Weyerhaeuser Co. was given approval on its application for a \$56,000 housing project for sawmill workers. An estimated 400 employees will be working at the plant when it gets into full swing, although Titcomb has reported that any influx of workers will be gradual.

Sewer Connections Searching to Begin

SPRINGFIELD—"Inch by inch" search for sewer "Y's" ordered by the city council April 2 is scheduled to start this weekend, Sig Moe, former partner in the Oregon Installation Co., has told the city council.

The inspection will be made to determine the exact location of risers for house connections on the main trunk sewer. The council ordered the search after a meeting with R. H. Corey and Adrian W. Vaaler, engineers on the job, and it was supposed to have started within a week. Moe said the delay occurred because the necessary equipment could not be obtained.

Contralto Gives Skillful Recital

A lovely voice and clear musical understanding were displayed by Elizabeth Howes, contralto, a senior in the University of Oregon school of music, in a recital Wednesday evening at the First Congregational Church. She was assisted by the church choir, skillful and expressive, and by Mary S. Grubbs, organist and choirmaster.

From the very first note Miss Howes' tone was free and pleasant. Her voice combines the warm rich low notes of a contralto with a delicately clear high register, used to good effect in two selections from "The Marriage of Figaro."

She seemed unusually aware of the sounds she was making, striving always to keep them beautiful.

The performance was marred only by some faulty voice placement, and occasionally vague diction. Her interpretations, however—and this is what indicates musicianship—were properly varied, exciting, and deeply subjective.

Sylvia Killman was the sympathetic and able accompanist.

Minister to Attend Consolidation Meeting

Rev. Wesley Goodson Nicholson of First Congregational Church left Sunday to attend a meeting of his denomination in Columbus, Ohio, at which a proposed union of the Congregational churches with Evangelical and Reformed Churches of the United States will be considered.

The union has been considered since 1940 and final plans for the

basis of union will be drafted at this meeting. Seventy-five percent of the churches of the country must cast affirmative votes. There are 11 Evangelical and Reformed Churches in Oregon, but none in Eugene.
