Racing Limit Said Unchanged

SALEM — (AP) — Running races cannot be substituted for harness races which were authorized by the 1947 Legislature, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Tuesday for the State Racing commission.
The Legislature allowed each horse track to hold an extra 20-day harness racing meet, in addition to the two-day running race meets, each year. The commission asked whether running races could be substituted if there were insufficient harness entries, but Neuner said the Legislature clearly limited the extra meet to harness horses.
In other opinions Tuesday, Neuner made the following rulings:
That the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners has authority to revoke the license of a chiropractor who was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to a maximum of three years in prison.
Pioneer Titles
Persons who own land abutting the Willamette, Coos, Coquille and Umpqua rivers, and who can trace their titles to patentees or other owners prior to 1878, own the land between high and low water mark abutting the rivers. But if the title was acquired from the government after 1878, then they have no claim to land below the high water mark.
The 1947 law which closes the Umpqua River to commercial fishing until 1953 supersedes all other laws regulating fishing on that river, as well as on the tributaries.
A county sheriff should collect fees of 8 cents a mile for serving summons, process, subpoena or other papers, collecting the money from the persons served. But the sheriff can keep only 5 cents of the amount, with the county court getting the other 3 cents.
