Episcopal Church To Try Advertising

ST. JOHNSBURY, Vt., (U.P.)—The Protestant Episcopal Church is planning a nation-wide advertising campaign to recoup membership losses, according to Ralph Jordan, promotion director of the Episcopal National Council.

He told the opening session of the 157th annual convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Vermont Tuesday night that during the past 25 years "there has been a drop of at least 50 per cent in confirmations in the church."

The national campaign, he said, would include a series of advertisements in farm papers and magazines as well as a coast-to-coast radio program similar to the Catholic hour.

Phone Company Charged by Union

DENVER (U.P.)—Charges of unfair labor practices were lodged by union officials Wednesday against the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co. A corporation statement denied that striking employees had been threatened with loss of service continuity records if they do not return to work at once.

L. H. Purdy, Colorado president of the Mountain States Federation of Telephone Workers, said the company had notified some striking employees in Idaho, Arizona and New Mexico they must return to work or have their service record broken.

Debt Payment Warning Given

LONDON (U.P.)—Britain's hold declaration that it will not pay in full war-born debts totaling more than four billion pounds sterling is the first blow in a new "tough" financial policy, highly placed sources said Wednesday.

Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton, the government's shrewd fiscal boss, delivered the punch Tuesday night. Wednesday, the creditors at whom it was aimed had not countered.

In dollars, Britain's debt totals more than 16 billions. And the dollar figure is important because the American loan with which Britain is trying to regain its economic equilibrium caused Dalton to speak out. Under the loan terms, Britain must make some move toward debt settlement by July 15.

In making the loan, the United States suggested that Britain get its creditors to scale down their claims. The United States itself holds Britain to no war debt. That was all settled under lend-lease, and Dalton himself said that if other creditors had operated during the war on the Anglo-American plan, Britain would not have the debt burden to wrestle with today.

Observers said Wednesday that Dalton was not speaking merely for the benefit of South Americans. His punch was delivered at bigger creditors—specifically India and Egypt.

'Mister Mutation' Tells Writer Of X-Ray's Potential Harm

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., (U.P.)—A hand down slight weaknesses hard to put your finger on, such as inability to stand high or low temperatures, a shortened life expectancy, a reduced bodily vigor, "The mutation could show up in the next generation or perhaps not for five thousand years. But the mutation is permanent and the damage is permanent. It remains until the line dies out by reason of that disability. And since we make every effort to keep people alive and reproducing, that may be thousands of years."

Dr. Muller and his colleagues have grants totaling \$181,000 from the Rockefeller Foundation, Indiana University and other sources to further genetic studies and research in cancer.

Dr. Muller, a small balding man of middle age, is the first man in history to show that these changes in the pattern of heredity can be artificially induced. He did it 21 years ago by subjecting fruit flies to changes in temperature and radiation.

He thereby produced fruit fly offspring with such new inheritable characteristics as three wings, a changed eye color, or a shortened life expectancy. He proved that such mutations are recessive and mostly deleterious—that for every such change which improved the fruit fly breed there were hundreds that hurt it.

His experiments also indicated that any artificially induced change was permanent, dying out only when the line of descent died out. It is for this reason that Dr. Muller urged a more careful use by the medical profession of X-rays.

"Mutations happen naturally all the time," he said. "But a heavy dosage of X-rays may speed up the rate of a million fold in a given period."

He was particularly critical of the use of X-rays to produce fertility in women long sterile. He said that medical men who employed such treatments were ignoring the certainty that X-rays in the required dosage would produce harmful mutations among the patient's descendants.

"Most mutations are not spectacular," he said. "That is, women treated in this manner probably won't start anything so dramatic as a line of two-headed children. But they will

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thereafter, Commission Member Peterson motioned for denial of the application.

The application of Loggers & Contractors was recommended for approval. If approved by the council, it will mean light industrial zoning for lots 2, 3 and 4 of Block 12, Croner's Second Addition. The firm's property is located on the south side of Fifth Ave. between Pierce and Fillmore Sts.

Attorney H. V. Johnson appeared for property owners who are protesting a zoning change in the area bounded by Seventh and Eighth Aves. W. and by Fillmore and Almaden Sts. The application was made by Stenwick and Kok, realtors, in behalf of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Wants Parking
The phone company wants the area rezoned from residential to business property for use as off-street parking adjacent to a building it will construct on property already zoned for business.

The issue brought hot debate between the realtors and the attorney, but no action was taken when it was decided that interested parties may be able to work out an agreement between themselves. The commission okayed vacation of the alley to the rear of the proposed building, providing a proper agreement can be reached with the city engineer to reserve all utility rights and easements for the city.

Recommend Approval
Commission members recommended approval of the Irish Swartz application for business zoning on Franklin Blvd.

The application of Royal Christoferson, 198 Seventeenth Ave. W., was tabled for further study, and the application of E. W. Barker, southwest corner Thirteenth Ave. and Lawrence St., was denied.

Petition Tabled
A petition from J. R. Mackey and others for rezoning to business 25 lots between University and Garden Sts. north of Franklin Blvd. was tabled pending outcome of the May 20 hearing.

All recommendations made by the commission are referred to the city council, which meets next Monday night, for adoption or whatever action council members deem necessary.
