Mrs. L. E. Tucker of Lincoln School P-TA was installed as president of the City Parent-Teacher Council at the annual luncheon of the council and units Monday afternoon at the Eugene Hotel. Installing officer was Mrs. Frank Rhodes, regional vice-president of the P-TA in Oregon in this area.

Other officers installed included Mrs. Paul Edwards, Dunn School, first vice president; Dean Lobach, assistant superintendent of schools, second vice-president; Mrs. E. A. Goodnough, Edison School, recording secretary; Mrs. Harold Pitcher, Stella Maglady School, corresponding secretary, and Mrs. A. E. Barker, Whiteaker School, treasurer.

Mrs. J. Don Smith, retiring president, presided at the luncheon, introducing guests and speakers. A festive air was lent the luncheon by announcement that the full \$50,000 cash has been received in the Park and Playground campaign, in which the P-TA co-operated with the sponsoring Business and Professional Women's Club, and a comfortable margin of pledges over. This announcement was made by W. M. Tugman, chairman of the recent campaign. Others introduced were Supt. and Mrs. Clarence Hines, Mayor Earl McNutt, Mrs. Max Bussis, City Manager Deane Seeger, and Don January, new superintendent of parks and playgrounds.

Mr. January talked of his plans for the playground, saying that it must be made to serve adults as well as children. Beyond the immediate plans for use of available recreation areas there will be a long-range plan, probably entailing at least five years. He foresaw need of a co-ordinating council which should represent all city organizations, to support the park department.

Mrs. Rhodes gave a brief resume of the state convention. There now are 390 units in Oregon, she said, and a total of 55,889 members of the P-TA in the state; more than four million members, nationally.

The jewels given by a Korean woman to the YWCA of America were displayed as the high point of the program at a potluck dinner meeting of the World Fellowship Committee of the YWCA, Monday evening at the Community Center. The three pieces, carved from white jade, coral and amber, will be on display this week at Laraway's Jewelry Store. It was announced.

The jewels were shown by Mrs. Clay A. Barnes, YW president, at the conclusion of her remarks on Korea, as part of the "Open Window" program of the evening. She told how the gift from an anonymous Korean woman was made by Dr. Helen Kim of Korea at an international YWCA convention; that it was given to strengthen the American YWCA, because the women of Korea look to it for help.

Other countries were discussed with relation to the work of the YWCA. Mrs. Dorothy Harter taking India; Mrs. George Spicer, Mexico; Mrs. E. E. DeCou, Turkey. Mrs. DeCou also added a note about Japan, from word she had received. Colleges for women are being re-established in Japan, she said, by a YWCA-trained Japanese woman whose training was supported by YW groups of the Northwest. Typical folk tunes of each country introduced each talk.

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Recipe

Wiener Schnitzel
1 pound veal
Salt
Pepper
Flour
Select slices of veal from the leg, about one half inch thick. Wipe, remove bone and skin and cut into serving pieces. Cover bone and trimmings with water and allow to simmer about thirty minutes. Sprinkle veal slices with salt and pepper. Dredge in flour. Then dip in slightly beaten egg and then in fine bread crumbs. Fry until nicely browned on both sides. Pour stock made of trimmings and bone over cutlets and cover. Simmer slowly for 45 minutes or until tender. Serve garnished with a slice of lemon topped with an anchovy fillet on each portion.

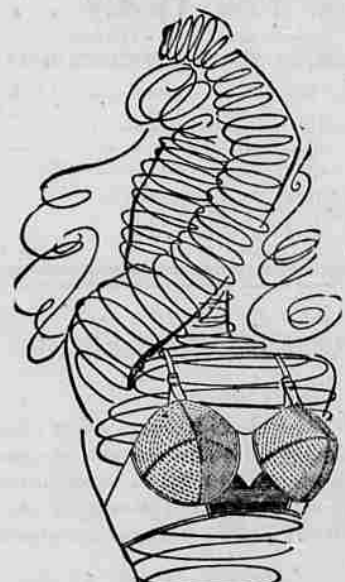
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
