Klamath Falls officers reported one of the boys was armed when they were arrested after wrecking an automobile stolen in Eugene earlier this week. The pair claimed to have stolen one car, driven to McKenzie Bridge, where they entered and robbed a cabin, returned to Eugene, stole another car and headed south on the Willamette Highway.

One youth was put on probation here by Circuit court order in January on charges of auto theft. The other had no previous Lane County delinquency record. Returned to Eugene the boys had not been charged Thursday with any of the specific acts they claimed when questioned by Klamath Falls police. 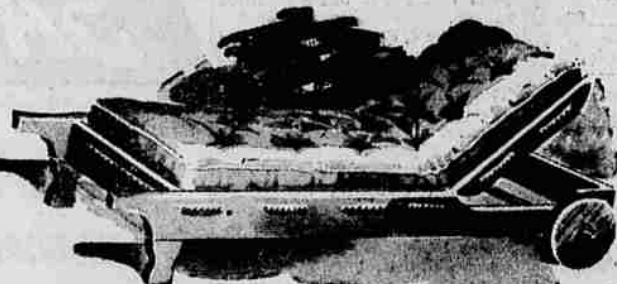

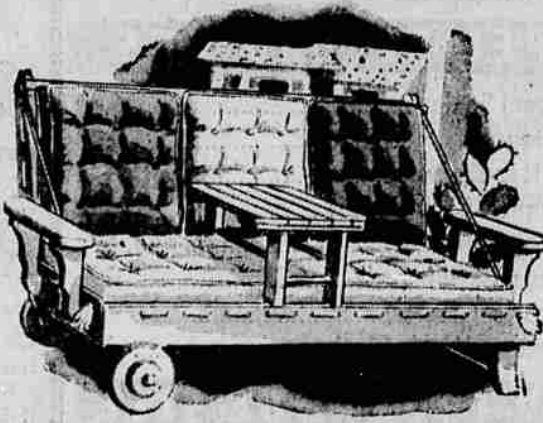
