Frank Whisman of Los Angeles is visiting his brother, Wm. Whisman, and has been assisting him with moving to Swiss home.

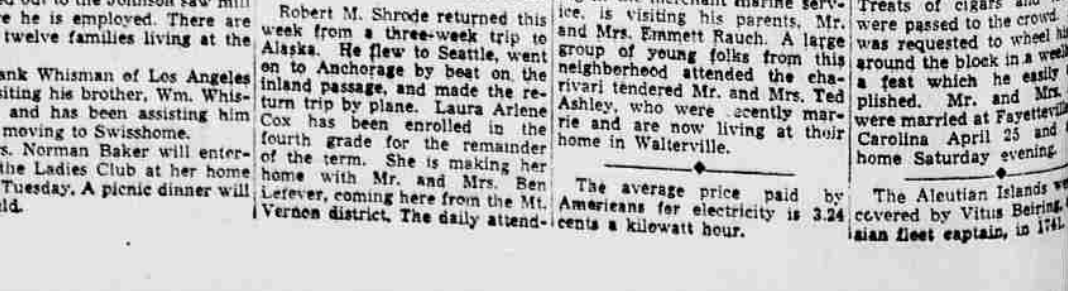
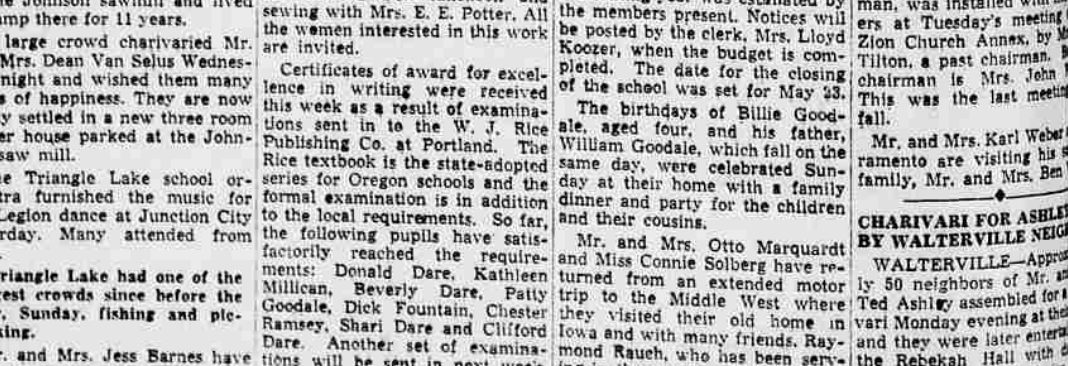
