

**Chinese Peace Move  
May Be Launched**

ANKING — The independent newspaper Hsinmin Monday reported that a peace movement might be launched by liberal members of the Peoples Political Council at the next meeting. The paper said the movement would be led by Democratic members of the PCC and free-thinking professors. The Hsinmin report followed re-

cent agitation, mostly among China's leftist elements, for ending what they called a "suicidal" civil war. Well-informed sources, however, while agreeing with the wisdom of halting the war, doubted the feasibility of the peace movement in recent circumstances. Observers were of the opinion that even if a peace movement got under way, it probably would be to no avail in the PCC since that body is still dominated by the Kuomintang. Government policy is officially committed to extermination of the Communists and an about-turn might be considered tantamount to a surrender.

**'Liberal' Group  
Sets Local Meet**

Portland speakers headed by Jan de Graeff, Sandy horticulturist, will open the organizational meeting in Eugene Friday night of the Progressive Citizens of America. The rally will be held at 8 p.m. in the county court room, upstairs in the courthouse, and Portland and Eugene entertainers will add variety to the program, according to Keith Bacon, temporary chairman of the Eugene group. The PCA, a national organization headed by Jo Davidson, sculptor, and Frank Kingdon, economist, has as its objectives "promotion of the United Nations and support for the liberal features of the New Deal tradition." Accompanying de Graeff to Eugene for the Friday meeting will be Thomas G. Moore, executive director of the Oregon PCA group; Lloyd Reynolds, professor of graphic arts and of international affairs at Reed College; and Robert Cannon, veteran's guidance counselor for the Portland center. Local members of the PCA Tuesday planned to have several speakers from Eugene on the program to kick-off organizational efforts here.

**Cemetery Lot-Owners  
Asked to Clean Up**

Persons owning lots in the old Odd Fellows Cemetery Pioneer Memorial Park near the University of Oregon are asked to clean their property at once so that the debris may be hauled away before Memorial Day, according to Ben Dorris, president of the Odd Fellows Cemetery Assn. Dorris said his group is cooperating with Don January, director of the Eugene park and recreation department, in plans to start immediate cleanup of the cemetery. The work will be under the supervision of Fred Lamb, as it was last year when over \$3300 was subscribed for cleaning up Pioneer Memorial Park and the Masonic Cemetery, to the south. No request for funds is contemplated this year as enough remains from last year's campaign to clear the walks and driveways, Dorris said. He added, however, that persons who wish to contribute to the association may do so through Fred Stickels, 117 East Broadway, secretary, or through the First National Bank of Eugene.
