Mrs. Dorothy Montgomery, 35, an ardent church-worker and the mother of three children, was slain and mutilated under a Los Angeles pepper tree last week.

Dep. Dist. Atty. Ernest Roli delayed issuing a complaint while he searched for more evidence. James V. Kennedy identified Montgomery as the man he saw park Mrs. Montgomery's car at about the time of her death. The Montgomery neighbors also said they heard screams from the house that night.

Wreck Holds Man 4 Days

OAKLAND, Cal.—(AP)—Ernest K. Steele, 26, told Tuesday how he lay for four and a half days with his right hand crushed in the wreckage of his automobile, while other motorists passed by without hearing his cries.

Steele was trapped when his automobile plunged into a creekbed alongside the road in lonely Franklin Canyon, eight miles northwest of Martinez, Cal. He was rescued Sunday.

Steele said he never gave up hope, but on the third day he scratched a farewell note to his wife on the fender of the car.

He said he wanted to escape by cutting off his right wrist, but couldn't reach his knife. Physicians at Permanente Foundation Hospital, where Steele was taken Monday, said the arm and wrist were so badly crushed it might be necessary to amputate.

During Steele's 110-hour ordeal, his wife, Mae, 24, a nurse, twice went to authorities to report his disappearance.

Steele, an oil worker, was driving home to Richmond from a fishing trip last Wednesday night, when he fell asleep. The automobile swerved off the road, crashed through a fence and plunged down an embankment 20 feet from the highway. He was knocked unconscious.

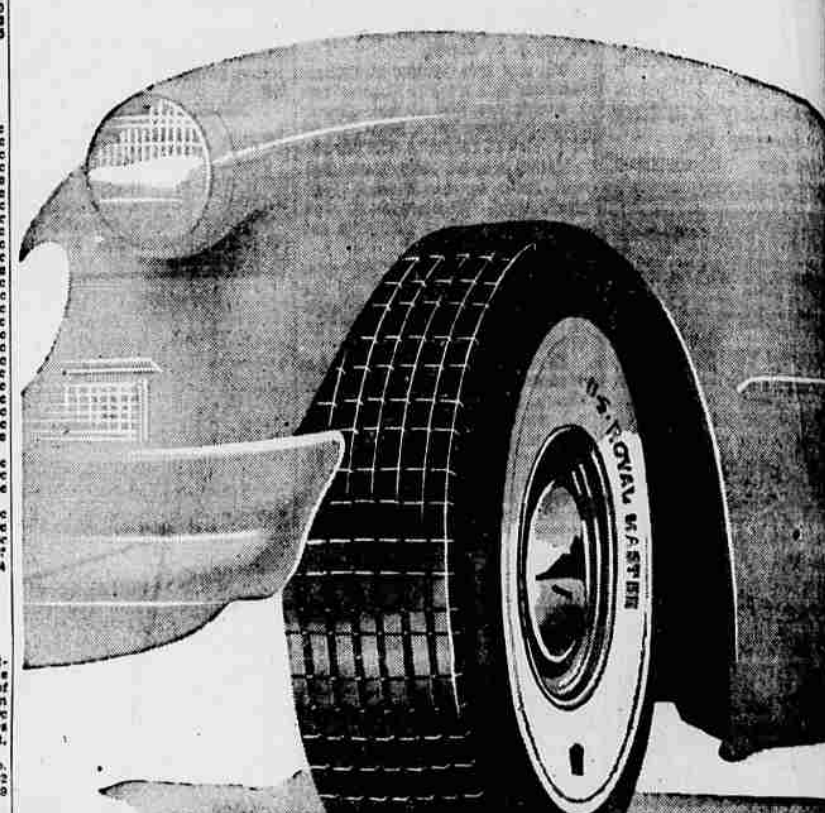
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
