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Erb Union Drive Totals Move Rapidly on Goal

A campus campaign more than doubled its quota, raising \$11,234.60. A Memorial to Student War Dead.

The building, from which will emanate most of the students' extra-curricular activities, will be a memorial to alumni who gave their lives during the war and to outstanding friends of the University as well as to Donald M. Erb, late president of the institution.

Arrangements have been completed so that memorial gifts can be made, setting aside certain student activity or committee rooms or other features in memory of particular persons. Plaques or other appropriate recognition will designate these rooms.

Plans for the building contemplate its being a beautiful but modest and efficient structure. For many students it will be a home away from home, for alumni and friends a convenient meeting place, and for the University an important contributor to its educational program.

Rooms for All Activity Purposes

Students and visitors will be able to hear good music, read good books in the browsing library, view outstanding art works in the art gallery, or sit and chat in the lounges. A cafeteria will provide hot lunches, table games an opportunity for play, and a big lunch room a place to eat for students who bring lunches.

Of importance to the University and to Eugene will be the ballroom-auditorium in which 800 couples may dance. As an auditorium, it will seat nearly 1500. Other major features will include banquet rooms, a cafe-grill on the roof, and student activity and committee rooms.

The building is estimated to cost a minimum of around \$1,300,000. Funds totaling \$700,000, comprising \$100,000 memorial gifts raised by students and friends and \$600,000 to come from student building fees, already are on hand. The current drive is intended to raise the additional minimum of \$600,000.

The requested budget for the public library will be \$18,737, less \$3000 revenue and \$2000 cash for a total requested appropriation of \$13,737. The library budget last year was \$19,497, minus a \$2,000 revenue.

Miscellaneous expenses totaling \$72,125.50 include such items as legal expense, audit expense, workmen's compensation, rodent control, pension and retirement fund, insurance, parking meters, civil service, elections, sanitation service municipal band, and planning commission.

The police department will spend most for personnel, with a recommended salary budget of \$91,920. Such expenses as prisoners' meals radio parts, telephone, meter parts, traffic signs, gasoline, mileage for the dog control officer, matron's office, supplies, insurance, heat for the jail, electricity and bunker lights. Office equipment and installation of a new short wave radio complete the total budget of \$111,855.

The largest items in the requested \$121,000 budget for the street and sewers division include personal services, \$56,300; maintenance and repair, \$18,000; materials and supplies, \$29,500; street widening, \$30,000; and traffic lights, \$5500.

The largest item in the requested budget of \$33,232 for the Eugene Water Board is to cover the cost of lighting and heating city offices, street lights, street flushing, water service, traffic signals, and other services provided by the municipal power system. Estimated revenues totaling \$416,204 will come from the following sources:

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Three Youths To Go to Court

Three local youths will be arraigned Monday in circuit court on indictments returned Friday by the grand jury. District Attorney C. E. Luckey announced.

Herbert Leo Higgins, charged with five counts of felonies, was found to be 15 years old. He had given several ages to questioning officers but records show that he is 15, Luckey said.

Five Counts

Donald G. Morgan, 22, also indicted on five counts, will be arraigned on charges of arson, destruction of personal property and attempt to burn a building at night.

Morgan is a 22-year-old Navy veteran, twice arrested for questioning in connection with fires. In January he voluntarily went to the Veterans' hospital in Roseburg for observation, but was released after a few weeks. The fire he is charged with setting were reported April 22.

Auto Charge

Robert E. Frost, nearly 18, faces arraignment on charges of grand larceny (alleged theft of an auto radio) and wrongfully taking and using an automobile.

State police said they had recovered about \$250 worth of stolen property (which will not be returned to owners until disposal of the Frost case) by questioning the youth.

Phone Strike Flares Again

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The national telephone strike, which had appeared heading swiftly for a patchwork settlement, flared anew on a country-wide scale Saturday night with an order for reinforced picket lines of equipment installation men.

The National Association of Communications Equipment Workers accused the Western Electric Co. of making an "open declaration of war" and of "union busting" tactics. It directed its members to man again the picket lines that had been abandoned over a great part of the country and called for "the aid of all legitimate labor unions in our struggle."

"We already have assurance that such aid will be forthcoming," George Weaver, president of the union, said in a statement. "Our battle against Bell System tyranny is the battle of all labor."

What Weaver called an "impasse" in negotiations here arose, he said, over a combination of proposals from the company for a "fish hook no-strike clause" and for wage provisions below the "pattern" of recent Bell system settlements.

Western Electric is the Bell system's manufacturer and supplier. The ACEW represents about 20,000 men who install exchange equipment. The local companies handle installation of individual telephone sets.
