

Three Youths Arraigned in Court After Indictments by Grand Jury

Three local youths were arraigned in circuit court Monday following indictments Friday by the Lane County grand jury.

Donald G. Morgan, 22, and Robert E. Frost, 17, both waived delay and entered pleas of not guilty. Morgan is accused in five indictments of setting fires allegedly started April 22. Frost is accused of stealing an auto radio and wrongfully taking and using an automobile.

Bond Raised
Morgan was free on \$2500 bail until Monday but was remanded

to the custody of the sheriff when Judge G. F. Skipworth increased the bond to \$5000 following arraignment on the five counts.

Frost is free on a \$2000 bond. Both are awaiting trial during the June term of circuit court.

Herbert L. Higgins, 15, was arraigned on five indictments at the same time but was given until next Monday to enter his pleas. Attorney W. P. Riddlesbarger was appointed to defend him. Higgins is accused of twice breaking and entering not in a dwelling, grand larceny, carrying a concealed weapon, and escape from arrest.

Won't Try
Bail had been previously set at \$5000 and Higgins was returned to the county jail after the arraignment. Judge Skipworth announced that he would not try the Higgins case because he believed himself disqualified, but would enter the boy's pleas next Monday.

The judge's son, Harold, is a city detective and may testify against the boy. The judge said that he did not think he could consider himself completely impartial in such a case.

Seaside Sees Daring Rescue

SEASIDE — (UP) — Two Salem women were recovering from shock Monday after an amphibious leap in which they were riding with four children and six others stalled in the surf here Saturday.

The "duck," operated by C. G. White, was making a routine crossing of the surf into the Pacific when the engine stopped. The 12 riders were doused with icy water for almost an hour as the jeep wallowed in the high waves. Rescue was made by means of a life-line carried through the surf by an unidentified swimmer. The line was attached to the jeep and pulled ashore by members of the Seaside volunteer fire department. Hundreds of spectators lined the beach to witness the rescue.

Mrs. W. K. Katsua, Jr., and Mrs. Homer Lyons, both of Salem, were treated for shock. Others were uninjured.

First aid was rendered by a woman who claimed to have been a Navy nurse and who was described as a "gorgeous redhead." After Katsua and Lyons were hospitalized, however, the redhead is reported to have returned and taken Katsua's 1939 black Ford coach and driven away. Neither the Ford nor the redhead has been seen since. License number was reported as Oregon 214-081. Missing with the car is a \$175 ring, wristwatch, clothes and luggage.

Oregon Payrolls At Peak Level

PORTLAND — (UP) — Oregon payrolls this year may top the previous high of 1944 if first quarter trends continue, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Monday.

Payrolls the first quarter of 1947 totaled \$195,000,000 to \$200,000,000, the highest for any similar peacetime period since 1936 and above the \$191,000,000 in 1945. The first quarter of 1946 was \$145,000,000.

The peak employment level of \$800,000,000 was in 1944.

Unemployment in the state dropped from 45,000 to 37,000 during April, a continuation of the steady decline since mid-February, the commission reported.

Willakenzie Grange To Back Sales Tax

Willakenzie Grange delegates to the State Grange convention at Bend in June will support the Oregon sales tax bill. A resolution endorsing the measure was adopted at the Willakenzie Grange meeting Saturday night, and delegates were instructed to back the bill.

The vote was taken after the issue had been debated by Glenn Simmons of Thurston Grange, who argued for the bill, and C. A. Schoelling of Junction City Grange, who opposed it. Schoelling formerly was a member of the State Grange legislative committee.

Lane County Pomona Grange and several subsidiary Granges in the county also have endorsed the sales tax.

Lucille Gleason Dies of Heart Attack

HOLLYWOOD — (UP) — Funeral services were to be arranged for Mrs. Lucille Webster Gleason, 59, an ex-actress whose greatest successes were plays written by her husband, James Gleason, for them to co-star in.

Mrs. Gleason had been ailing for the past year and a half. Her husband found her dead in bed Sunday, apparently of a heart attack.

The actress had a successful full stage career with her husband from coming to Hollywood in 1928 for a screen career which she abandoned five years ago.

Northwest Building Slump Shown in Report

SEATTLE — (UP) — George W. Coplen, regional housing expediter, Monday said the number of federal housing administration permits issued for new apartment and homes in five western states totaled 8564 from Jan. 1 through May 10 this year.

He said the total issued in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming for the same period last year was 23,444.

Coplen said the demand for high-cost homes was weakening while the demand for medium and low-priced homes in the Pacific Northwest continued strong.

Restriction on Barber Licenses Illegal

PORTLAND — (UP) — An Army veteran who is a native of the Philippines, has a right to be an Oregon barber if he desires a license, Circuit Court, Judge Charles W. Redding has ruled.

Judge Redding declared the Oregon statute of 1927, requiring barber applicants be citizens, was unconstitutional. Sammy Q. Quisor brought the suit against the state board of barber examiners which previously refused him an apprentice license. He is a long time resident of Portland.

AWOL Milk Driver Found Back in Army

HOLDREGE, Neb. — (UP) — Burton J. Jones, veteran of World War II, disappeared while driving a loaded milk truck from Holdrege to North Platte.

Three days later the milk company found its truck, loaded with sour milk, in an Elm Creek filling station.

A week later a routine news release from the Grand Island recruiting station revealed that Jones had re-enlisted and already was at a replacement training center, 1500 miles away.

VLT's Shaw Drama Provides Evidence of Actors' Maturity

Artistically, from every angle, VLT's current production of George Bernard Shaw's "Candida" hits a real "high," and it is a refreshing change from the "corn shows" which the organization has used to "pack 'em in" and swell the building fund.

Not only the acting but the set design, the lighting, the costume and even the incidental music combine to display the skill of Marvin Krenk as director. Also this old-timer of Shaw's is always fine entertainment. The audiences chuckle deeply and constantly.

Good Cast
With Horace Robinson as the windy moralist and reformer, Morell; Fred Cahill as the amazing young poet, Marchbanks; and Daisy Hamilton fitting naturally into the role of the lovely and witty Candida, Krenk needed only to persuade Dr. Leslie White to do the scoundrelously cockney Burgess; Ladely Houghlum to flounce as "Prossy"; and Doug Brinkman to be a lipping curate—and he had a cast the equal of most professional groups and better than many who work for pay.

Maturity is the characteristic of this show which gives it "conviction." All of the players know their Shaw and read the lines with restrained gusto. Since the play runs only through Thursday night (account of high royalty and university show coming up)

there should be a rush to make reservations at the Willamette St. grocery (125). Curtain is at 8:15 p.m. and the show runs in less than two hours.

State Rests In Lynch Case

GREENVILLE, S. C. — (UP) — The state rested its case Saturday against 31 white men accused of lynching a South Carolina Negro, and Circuit Judge J. Robert Martin, Jr., took under advisement defense motions for directed acquittal of ten defendants.

Judge Martin said he would consider the applications over the weekend, and announce his decision Monday when he reconvenes Greenville County's criminal court.

The state accused all 31 with murder and with conspiracy to murder in connection with the brutal lynching of Earle. The Negro was taken from the county jail in adjoining Pickens County, questioned on a lonely roadside by the lynchers, and then taken to a spot near an old slaughterhouse where he was beaten, knifed and finally shot to death.
