NEW YORK, May 21—(AP)—The stock market rebounded today in one of its best rallies of the year under the leadership of industrials and rails.
Buying orders in fair volume came in the fourth hour, lifting the list from an earlier irregular trading range. Rails, oils, steels, motors and some special stocks joined the upturn, bringing advances ranging to around 3 points. Total transactions increased to around 1,100,000 shares.
Wide gains included Santa Fe, Schenley, Chrysler, Coca Cola, Pepsi-Cola, Standard Oil (N.J.), Texas Co., Timken Roller Bearing (on a good earnings report), American Tobacco "B", International Harvester, May Department Stores, Douglas Aircraft, U.S. Gypsum, Phelps Dodge (ex-dividend), Southern Railway, Great Northern preferred, International Paper and American Can. Depressed were U.S. Hoffman (on deferment of dividend action) and Twentieth Century-Fox.
Commission houses said short covering and buying by customers seeking quick-turn profits on an unexpected comeback from recent lows placed a platform of support under most sections of the list.
