## Students Told to Get Social Security Listing

Social security account numbers should be applied for at once by students who expect to enter industrial or commercial employment after graduation this June or during summer vacation, Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene office of the Social Security Administration, announced Wednesday.

"Of course students who already have Social Security cards," Monroe said, "should not apply again, because the same account number is used during an individual's entire life. But persons not having cards should get them before starting work so that their wages may be properly reported, identified, and credited to their Social Security accounts."
