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New Fire Truck On Way to City Eugene fire department was informed Saturday that its new fire truck, on order for a year and a half, has been shipped and will arrive here about June 8. The 1000-gallon pumper was shipped from the Elmira, N. Y., factory of American Lafrance Foamite Corp. The new truck will replace one of the old trucks purchased during World War I, and will give the city six pieces of equipment. The old truck will be used for stand-in service only. It will be the first new truck since 1941, when the city bought a 750-gallon pumper. The new truck cost the city about \$13,000. It has been paid for with money from the equipment fund.

City 'Evicts' Local Rent Control Staff The rent control office is being "evicted" from the City Hall. The offices, under Director Rupert K. Shaw explained that the City of Eugene had obligingly canceled its lease (which extended until July 1), thereby saving the government a month's rent. War II Dead Given Honor A bronze plaque bearing the names of 11 men from the University of Oregon chapter of Theta Chi fraternity who gave their lives in World War II was dedicated Memorial Day by the Rev. Wesley Nicholson, pastor of the Eugene Congregational church. The plaque was placed in the cement base of the house flagpole, presented to the fraternity by Leonard Ballif, Sr., whose son was killed in 1942 in an airplane crash. The flag was taken from a battleship. Ed Bailey, a close associate of the fraternity, made a short speech at the dedication ceremony. Names placed on the plaque are those of Thomas M. Graham, Oak Grove, class of 1927; John F. Holloper, Portland, '38; Clifford E. Kamm, Harbor, '37; Ralph L. Russell, '38; Harry Hewitt, Eugene, '39; Frederick L. Pankey, Chiloquin, '39; L.
