ST. LOUIS—(U.P.)—An air-minded schoolboy whose attempt to take off in a Mississippi River seaplane here landed him in police custody will be airborne soon.

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the plane owner said here. Juvenile authorities said they thought Vernon Ray Cole, 9, a third-grade student who floated downstream in the Republic Seaplane, was the youngest recorded suspect of plane theft.

"He looks like a pretty smart boy who needs a break," said Cecil Petty, partner in the flying service from whose barge Vernon shoved off.

"I'll give him his first ride and show him that stealing is one thing and asking for something you really want is another," he added.

Vernon drifted several hundred yards in the plane before it bumped into a barge, whose towboat captain pulled him from the cockpit and turned him over to police.

Booked "delinquent by larceny of a seaplane," he explained that he had always had a yearning to fly and this had been his first chance to climb into a plane.

"I've drawn pictures of lots of them and I go around where they are every chance I get," he said. "I could fly that airplane. I'm sure I could."

"Didn't you know that was stealing?" he was asked.

"I guess I just didn't think anything about it," Vernon replied.

Committee Favors Postmaster Probe

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The Senate Civil Service Committee Tuesday approved, 6 to 3, a resolution authorizing an investigation of 775 pending postmaster nominations.

The resolution goes next to the rules committee and then to the Senate.

It provides a \$33,000 fund for an investigation "as to political activities in the civil service" in the appointment of first, second and third class postmasters. "and whether any postmasters on threat of losing their positions have been compelled to pay tribute financially or otherwise to anyone or to a group of politicians."

The clinic, which deals with all types of handicapped or exceptional children, this year will handle only those children experiencing reading and spelling difficulties, Dr. Killgallon declared.

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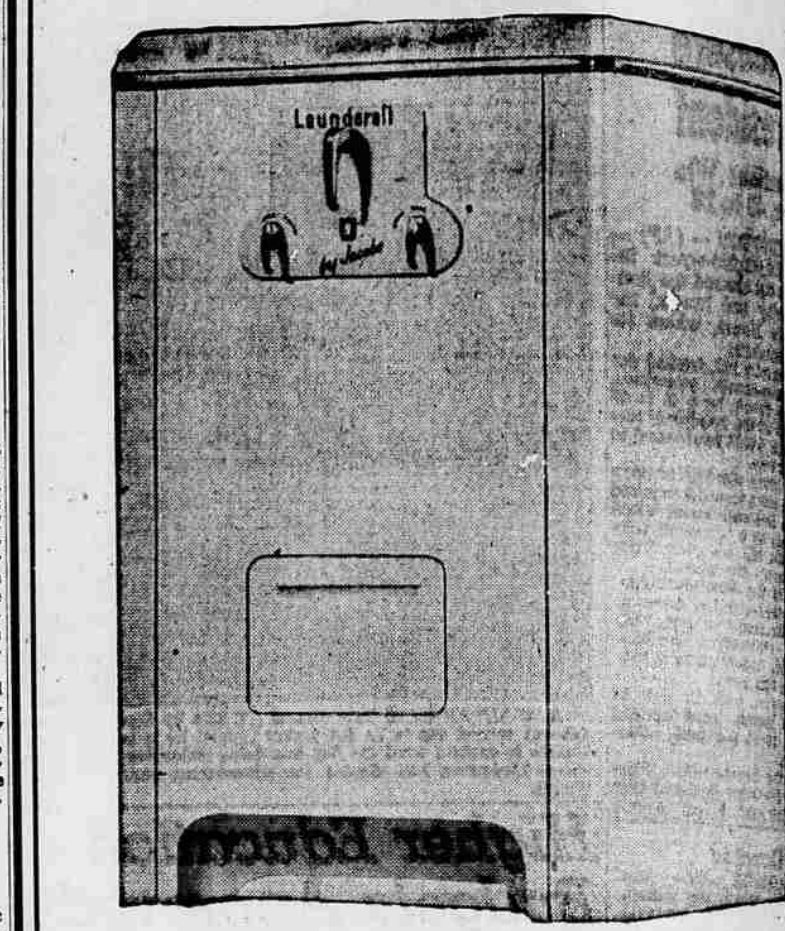
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
