

County Agent Discounts Effect Of Mormon Cricket 'Invasion'

HEPPNER, Ore.—(P)—Mormon crickets are being taken pretty much in stride here in Morrow and in adjacent Gilliam counties, Morrow County Agent N. G. Anderson said Friday, with control work having been under way since March 19.

Apparently permanent residents in the old army desert country in the old army desert range near Boardman, where crickets have been more

troublesome than usual this year, Anderson said, but have caused little actual damage.

The major infestation areas are around Lone and Cecil with a potential threat along a 22-mile front extending from Butter Creek on the east to Willow Creek on the west. This is southwest of the Ordinance area where a heavier attack has been controlled, Anderson said the crickets have

penetrated as much as 200 feet into wheat fields along a five-mile stretch, but for the most part are nibbling away only 30 feet into the fields. The females, he said, appear to be remaining in the desert where they are laying eggs.

A few ranches whose fields have not been attacked in other years are showing some concern, the county agent said, but he called the situation "under control" and not alarming.
