That meant that unless all of the remaining eight switch sides, a veto would be overridden.

Of that group, the only one who said he probably would shift to support a veto was Sen. John J. Sparkman (D-Ala.)

Of the 21, all except Scott W. Lucas, Ill., voted for or were an- nounced in favor of the bill on the final 54-17 vote Friday. Lucas, who was absent Friday, voted for the original Senate version of the bill.

**Vetoes Seen Likely**  
Speculation that Mr. Truman would veto the bill was supported by indications that his labor ad- visers, Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach and the National Labor Relations Board, would urge him to do so.

Organized labor, a potent political force in big city industrial strongholds, wanted a veto.

In view of Mr. Truman's re- peated opposition to tax cuts this year, a veto of the Republican tax bill seemed even more likely. He has until midnight June 16 to de- cide on that issue.

premier was still in good humor though he remarked, "Ferenc Nagy was never questioned like this."

The day brought these other developments in the Hungarian capital:  
1. The British sent a second sharp request to the Russian com- mander in Budapest asking copies of documents allegedly linking Nagy to a plot to overthrow the Hungarian republic.

2. A reliable Hungarian source said that more than 200 Hungar- ians, many of them former resis- tance fighters against the Ger- mans, had been seized by the Communist police and held for questioning since Nagy's resig- nation.

# Leaders Confer

LONDON — Officials of the three Balkan nations most firmly under Communist domination met Saturday in the Yugoslav capital of Belgrade, apparently setting the stage for what British sources be- lieve may be the next act in the Communist drive to consolidate Soviet power in eastern Europe.

The economic character of Ro- manian and Albanian government missions greeted by Marshal Tito led observers to believe that a possible Soviet answer to the Truman doctrine of economic aid to Greece, Turkey and European na- tions may be shaping there.

The three-day meeting, official- ly described as a "visit of friend- ship," was taking place against the backdrop of Tito's demand last Monday for a Balkan federation to help the "peaceful economic de- velopment" of the Balkan nations.

So important was the Belgrade meeting viewed in Soviet circles that the Yugoslav government press office found it necessary to deny knowledge last Monday of a report that Soviet Foreign Minis- ter V. M. Molotov and Assistant Foreign Minister Andrei Vishin- sky would attend.

# UN Status for Ex-Axis States Gaining Favor

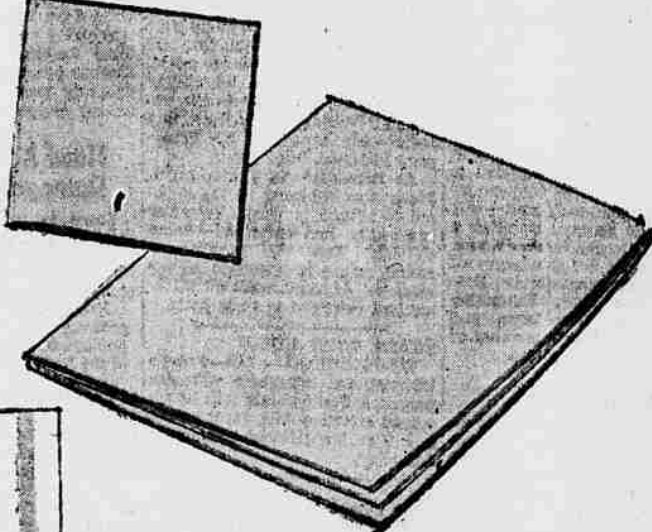

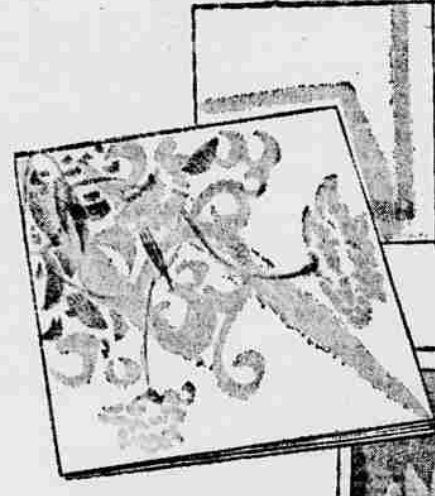
