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Freight Building Gets 'Go' Sign

Consolidated Freightways Inc., in Eugene, led local building permits granted Saturday from the Oregon District Construction Review Committee in Portland with one for a \$109,000 terminal and warehouse, according to the Associated Press.

Local Manager John Prociw said Saturday that construction would start in about three weeks on the L-shaped building between Jackson and Monroe Sts. on First Ave. One wing will be 50 by 146 feet, the other, 50 by 156.

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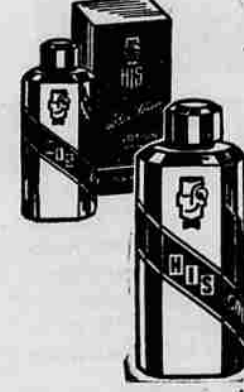
