Total expenditures, \$34,064.20; estimated receipts, \$25,512.64; tax levy, \$8,551.56; inside the 6 per cent limitation, \$896.66; outside the 6 per cent limitation, \$7655.

# Western Lane C of C Meets at Airport

FLORENCE—Western Lane County Chamber of Commerce will have its July 12 meeting at the Florence Municipal Airport, with Hans Petersen to complete detailed arrangements. He was granted \$25 by the group to underwrite expenses.

Two committees were appointed in the interests of the airport, one to contact the Central Lincoln PUD at Newport in an effort to have a line built to supply electrical power to the field, and one to solicit the backing of the city council in an effort to have telephone facilities installed.

Statistics are being compiled to be presented proper authorities endeavoring to get the dredge "Pacific" to the river bar, now presenting an acute hazard to deep sea fishermen using the port facilities at Florence. The peak of the fishing season occurs during the month of August, when as many as 80 trawlers tie up at Florence for a night.
