

Trailer Home Good Living, They Prove

A five-room house on wheels solved the housing problem of J. G. and Mona Watts of Mendocino, Calif., who are displaying their "motor dream home" at 1000 North Ave. W. and Willamette St. Friday and Saturday.

The couple are en route to Seattle in their motor home, which is complete with bedroom, bathroom, laundry room, kitchen, living room and living room, and driver's cockpit. Watts said special arrangements make it possible to drive any highway without spilling

ing water from flower vases or cooking utensils.

A machinist and welder by trade, Watts spent three hours a night for two years before the home on wheels was ready to roll. The trailer house is not for sale, but the Watts have displayed it at numerous cities in California. They charge no admission for visiting the home on wheels, but Mona takes contributions to pay for the cleaning job after visitors stream through.

The trailer will be open to the public from noon to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday. After that, the Watts will drive to Seattle where they will continue to live in their home on wheels.

Timber Firm's Research Men Discover Uses for Fir Bark

LONGVIEW, Wash.—(AP)—Once destroyed as useless waste, the bark of trees processed in a high lumber mill here is being made into ingredients for phonograph records, explosives, adhesives, plastics and scores of other commercial products.

The Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. announced Friday that it had perfected a process for complete commercial utilization of Douglas fir bark, which roughly is 12 percent of the log. This is the first time bark has been fully utilized on a commercial basis, and is a solution to an expensive waste problem for the lumber industry. Although hundreds of commercial

Alaska Fights Forest Blazes

ANCHORAGE, Alaska.—(AP)—Alaskan forest fire fighters Friday began to bring four major forest fires under control near here.

The two largest fires were in the big game country of the Kenai Peninsula and along the Palmer Highway, 18 miles from Anchorage, where the fires near the homesteads started by veterans have consumed an estimated 22,000 acres.

The Kenai Peninsula fire, with both sides of the Hidden Lake area ravaged, appeared to be slowly dying. Fires were now in brush and not leaping from treetop to treetop as during the past several days, according to R. R. Robinson, Alaska fire control system chief.

Three Army fire fighting crews fighting the Palmer road fire may be able to quit today after bulldozing trenches to halt the advance of the flames. Alaska Road Commission men had their first rest in eight days after being pressed into service on both major fires.

Two other fires, in more remote areas, seemed burning out according to Alaska bush pilots. More fires were expected because of dry weather and low precipitation in the interior of the territory and the anticipated usual summer lightning storm.

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Defense Opens Case In Murder Trial

PORTLAND—(AP)—The defense took over Friday in the first degree murder trial of Patrick Raymond, 40, night club operators accused of beating to death ship Capt. Frank B. Tatum last January.

The prosecution closed its case Thursday after John Snyder, former Raymond aide, turned state's evidence and testified that Raymond was solely responsible for the slaying.

He said Tatum and Raymond, who was indicted as Patrick O'Day, got into a fight at the Cecil Club and that later when he helped carry Tatum out, the mariner's head "flopped around," and "I believed him dead."

Snyder, once indicted along with Raymond and Harold Sehorn, 25, on first degree murder charges, pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter before testifying, as had Sehorn before him.

Four Districts Plan Consolidation Votes

School elections in four Lane districts have been set for June 23 to decide on consolidation. Mrs. Lucille Kennedy, county superintendent, said Friday.

Oak Hill (District 8), Clear Lake (23), Malabon (138), and Alvadore (186) voters will make known their decision between 7 and 8 p.m. June 23 in their respective schoolhouses.

The consolidation of the four districts is being recommended for more efficient operation of the schools serving the communities, Mrs. Kennedy said.
