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Thurston Budget and Annual Meeting Monday

THURSTON—Monday, 8 p. m., the patrons of Thurston grade school district will meet at the grade school to elect one director for the local school district to serve for a three-year term, and one director for the new five-man county school board from rural district number 3. of which Thurston is a part. They will also vote on the following budget for the coming school year: General control, \$468.40; instruction, \$15,300; operation of plant, \$2550; maintenance and repairs, \$700; auxiliary agencies, \$3080; fixed charges, \$1600; capital outlay, \$4000; emergency, \$1500; debt service, \$3285.

Estimated receipts for the year are \$9638.61, leaving a total of approximately \$22,846.78 to be raised by special tax within the district.

As only \$1,340.90 is the amount permitted within the 6 per cent limitation, it will be necessary to vote to exceed this limitation in order to accept the budget as prepared.

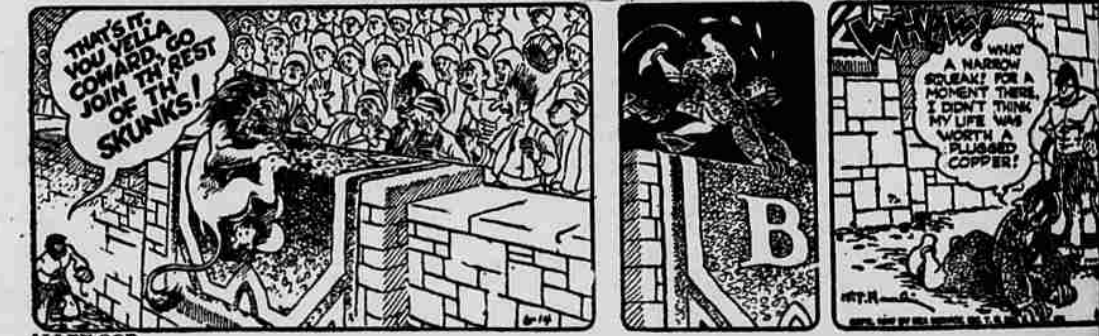

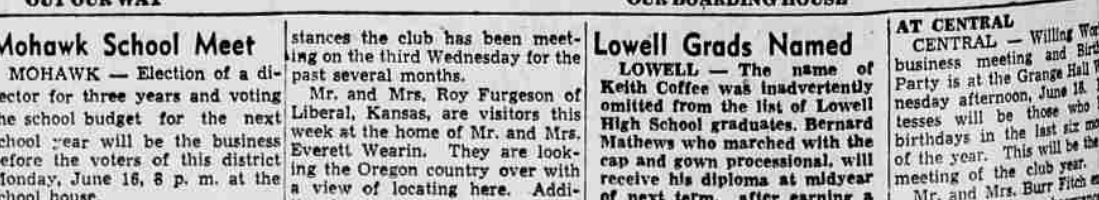
