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Major Tells Rights Of Army Enlistees

"The GI Bill of Rights is still in existence," according to Maj. Carl Hornsby of the Army Recruiting station in Eugene, "and the educational advantages under the bill apply to any man who enlists prior to the official termination of the war."

The war, according to presidential proclamation, will not be ended until all peace treaties are signed and ratified.

One day of active duty before the war is terminated entitles a man to 12 months of schooling. A three-year enlistment completed before the war's end means 48 months of schooling at the government's expense.

PBY Rescue Flight Fails; Man Dies

SEATTLE—A 300-mile rescue flight by a PBY plane from Port Angeles to Bull Harbor, B. C., failed Friday, the Coast Guard member died of a heart attack before the plane arrived to take him to a hospital.

The man's name was not known but the coast guard report said he was understood to be elderly. The vessel was the Shirley Lee, a 70-foot craft owned by J. C. McMillan, whose address was not available to the coast guard. It was thought the craft came from a Columbia River port.
